PASTOR'S ARTICLE



NEW DIRECTOR of WORSHIP and MUSIC!

It is my pleasure to announce that the council voted to accept the unanimous recommendation of the Search Team and offer the position of Director of Worship and Music to Luke Nicolay.

Luke holds two master's degrees from the University of Kansas, one in organ and one in choral conducting. Currently Luke serves as the Music Director at Peace Lutheran Church (LCMS) in Kansas City, Missouri. There he leads two worship services with music that ranges from Renaissance choral works and handbell choir to contemporary praise.

But Luke's greatest asset is not his resumé, it's his personality. The Search Team spent Monday through Friday with our two finalists, most days picking them up at 8am for breakfast and dropping them off after 8pm. In between we took the candidates to see everything in Chico from sitting down with guests at the Jesus Center, going on a hike in Upper Park, touring CSU, eating at Sierra Nevada, and of course, rehearsing with the musicians at Faith. We dedicated this time in part so that the candidates would get to know us and Chico, but also that we would see what it was like to spend large amounts of time with the candidates. What we discovered is that spending 12 hours a day with anyone is exhausting. But with Luke, even when we were dead-tired, we would find ourselves smiling. Luke has a joyful spirit combined with humility and an eagerness to learn. This spirit brought out a playfulness in both the Search Team and the choir.



Late into the night and early the next morning, the Search Team was excited to brainstorm and kick around possibilities with Luke about what we could create together in worship. Choir rehearsal was punctuated by laughter that disarmed the group and gave us both the confidence to sing out and the openness to receive Luke's direction. At the end of rehearsal not only did the choir sound really good, people left saying how much they enjoyed the experience.

Luke has accepted our job offer and will begin on February 24th, just in time for Ash Wednesday. It will take time for Luke to get the full feel for Faith Lutheran, figure out our various systems, and help us improve them. But from our time together and talking to his references, the Search Team feels confident that Luke will be a hard worker, a fast learner, and a joy to collaborate with. So please take time to get to know Luke, share with him the various ways you serve Christ here at Faith, and ask how you might support each other as we move into our next chapter of worshipping and praising God together.

In the meantime, please join me in sharing your gratitude for the incredible work that our Musical Transition Team of Margaret McMillan, Linda Zimbelman, Christine Buckstead, and Daun Weiss, have been doing.

And from the bottom of my heart, thank you to the Search Team of Janine Rush, Bill Kees, Raquel Krach, Ted Sandberg, Daun Weiss, and Margaret McMillan for their hard work, dedication, and prayerful discernment.

We are blessed to be surrounded by such good and faithful servants of the Lord.

LETTER from the PRESIDENT



Every church council has its tasks set by the immediate demands and the long-term vision of its congregation. Councils pretty much have to deal with the cards they are dealt; time, energy, and financial resources have to go to needs and larger commitments to the mission of the church. Our previous Council worked largely on the challenges of professional staffing and physical plant—exploring our strengths and resources; hiring four new staff (some into newly created positions) and keeping our 30-40 year-old buildings supporting our mission. I know Raquel and the great people she worked with constantly miss those days!

As we head into the third decade of this century and the eighth decade of our church's founding, this Council is also working to prepare and equip us for the demanding ministries that will occupy us in the coming years. In the coming months we hope to explore emerging opportunities for ministry in Chico and beyond, and steward our church property as the hub of that service. As we read the Gospel of Matthew in the lectionary this year, we need to ask the question: "what does Jesus expect from us in our present situation in Chico?" What does it mean for our work on behalf of Christ to be the only ELCA Church in Chico, and one of only about a dozen congregations in the center of town? What sorts of mission opportunities are created by our changing membership, the neighborhood we live in, and the neighbors that live around us? Will the Camp Fire, increasing homelessness, the financial pressures on young families, and the changing makeup of Chico's population inform how we think about our mission to this community? Does our stable financial situation give us opportunities for ministry that might not be available to other struggling congregations? Based on our many rich conversations over the past few years—and in light of the "new normal" of life in Chico—the **Church Council is spending this year developing a new mission statement** for Faith. We will discuss this more in the Spring, but that statement will be important in helping us decide what to say "no" to (to the things that we won't take on and the type of church we won't be) so that we can say "yes" to an identity and an agenda that really expresses what it means to be God's people here and now.

I am hopeful that by the time you read this note we will be well on our way to filling the position of Director of Music vacated just a couple months ago by Kevin. I want to give my heartfelt thanks to the hard work that **Janine and the Music Director Call Committee** have put in to selecting finalists, conducting interviews, selling Chico, and revealing the rich spirit and beauty of our Faith Lutheran community. So many great talents have worked to fill the gap left by Kevin—including Daun, Christine, Margaret, Linda, and musicians and members of all stripes and specialties. Your efforts and commitment are on display every week, and we could not have made it through the past two months without your help!

Visitors who come to our church (including new families, those seeking assistance, delivery and service people, individuals attending classes, musical groups using our space) often struggle to figure out where to go for their meetings, classes, worship, and fellowship. It's surprisingly easy to get lost in the middle (or is it muddle) of our three buildings and three parking lots! We are about to **install a new signage system** for the church grounds; clear messages that will invite people into our familiar space rather than confusing them as they wander around trying to connect. And we will continue to work to upgrade the paint, lighting, furniture, and various spaces on our property for those who work, worship, and learn here.

The **Equipping Ministry Team** (who you will hear from in early March during a Sunday morning FACE class) have been working diligently on the design of welcoming and hospitality activities (they were the brains behind the Christmas Eve welcoming tent and the many cups of cider and coffee I consumed). They are also designing new member name tags to make it easier to get to know all those "strangers" who are part of our church. Those name tags--coupled with a new member directory and more active recruiting of members and guests into ministries where they want to serve--is one important part of keeping this church alive, relevant, and inviting. You can be sure that you'll be approached in the coming months by members of this ministry team to consider new ways to serve, connect, and grow.

Our **Columbarium Committee** (especially Bob and Susan) has spearheaded a revitalization of our columbarium and garden. New teak benches have been assembled and installed; a seating area established (with more tables and plants to come); exploration of an expansion of the number of columbarium niches is underway (we only have a very few left in the old structure); and landscaping and irrigation will undergo a refresh as we move into the coming year. This is one of our most important and supportive ministries at Faith--even though it is out of sight and out of mind for most of us. The gardens and space back there, however, are beautiful and can be used by anyone looking for some tranquil and reflective space on our busy campus.

Our sanctuary is brighter these days after **Mark Kimmelshue installed new LED bulbs** in the heritage shades in our sanctuary (for those of you who are new to Faith, these stained glass works of art came into the new sanctuary thirty years ago from our old sanctuary building). This lighting should help musicians and speakers read their musical and written notes, and we will have more control over the range of light that we can take advantage of in our worship space.

Our largest capital project this year will be **a new sound system for our sanctuary**. The existing system is now quite old, harder to service, and not as effective as it could be—for worship, but also for lectures, concerts, weddings, funerals, and other events. In the coming months we will begin rewiring the sanctuary, moving to more wireless mics, installing a new sound board (with a contract for diligently training technicians on its use), adding a speaker to the pulpit, piping speakers into the cry room and the nursery, and upgrading the wireless connections to all buildings.

In addition, we are going to install new AV, public address, and speaker systems in the Fellowship Hall and in our newly designated AV/Theatre viewing Room 6. All of these improvements will give us greater versatility with our spaces, improvements in listening experiences, and facilitate ease of use by preachers, lectors, musicians, teachers, and guests.

Blessings on all of you in the coming months. Our **Safe Space Ministry** in January has given us a wonderful start to our continuing mission of service to Chico; and I look forward to a busy and blessed year. Lots of great opportunities for fellowship and service are knit into the fabric of this community. Take some time to see what it has to offer, and join in the dance!

MINISTRY SCHEDULER PRO – PLEASE UPDATE!



***Christ in Crisis: Why we need to reclaim Jesus* – February 2 and 9**





Safe Space Winter Shelter - January

These last two weeks, we have housed approximately 50 people who had no place to sleep in this cold, wet weather thanks to Safe Space. Another thank you to approximately 70 members of Faith who opened their doors and housed, fed, and served these strangers with love.



Torres Shelter - February

Our family has been serving at Torres Shelter for many years. It has been part of our family's life to serve. As our two boys grew up I feel it has been good for their "life understanding" to serve there. They saw that the homeless people are just people who have fallen on difficult times. It has been good for our family to see that the people who reside at the Torres Shelter are very appreciative of the warm meal, the roof over their heads, showers, support and even comradery with others in the same situation. They are not alone. It is a true warm fuzzy to be appreciated for doing something that is so easy to do.



However, to take it in another direction, it is a day-long commitment. The menu has to be decided upon, call the shelter to see how many folks will be eating that night to determine how much food to purchase then purchase the food, prepare the food, set up the serving area, and lastly, the actual serving. None of these tasks are hard to do, but they all must be done. The shelter has a cleanup crew so we no longer have to do cleanup. We have been doing this approximately four times a year.

We would like to invite folks/families to join us in this ministry. As you all know we are a church that likes to serve and this is an excellent way to do so. We experience such a feeling of joy and compassion to serve these children of God by helping at the Torres Shelter.

If you feel drawn to this ministry it would be easy to get a taste of the process by just helping to serve with one of the groups. FLC is responsible for the first Tuesday of each month. FLC provides the funding by giving us access to the Cash and Carry card. It would be wonderful to have you join and share in this ministry.
