

PASTOR'S ARTICLE

ST. FRANCIS DAY



October 4th is the festival day of St. Francis, patron saint of animals, merchants, and ecology. As we do each year, we will once again be using this festival as an opportunity to bless the animals in our lives. But this year, St. Francis's Day takes on a special significance. For many of us, our pets have been our primary companions in the past six months. For many of us, nature has been the place in which we've found peace and a semblance of normalcy during this pandemic. For all of us, the smoke of the past six weeks has been a reminder that the health of our natural resources directly affects our health.

It's easy to see how nature matters to us. But as Christians, let us also ask, how does nature matter to God?

The scriptures make clear three major themes about the Creator's relationship with non-human creation: 1) God cares about the well-being of the natural world. 2) Jesus' redeems not just people, but all of creation from human sin. 3) All of creation praises God as part of a cosmic congregation.

God cares for the natural world, not just because of the ways it supports human life, but because everything that God created is a delight to God. The very first chapter of the bible is a description of how God makes everything in the universe, from light, to stars, water, plants, and animals, and after each thing, God sees that they are good (Genesis 1). God continues to care for God's good creation throughout the bible. Psalm 104 is 35 verses praising God for not only creating the world, but for ensuring the well-being of its inhabitants. The psalmist sings, "You make springs gush forth in the valleys; they flow between the hills, giving drink to every wild animal...The young lions roar for their prey, seeking their food from God...how many are your works, LORD! In wisdom you made them all; the earth is full of your creatures...these all look to you to give them their food in due season." Jesus affirms that God clothes flowers in the splendor of their beauty and cares individually for each sparrow and will not forget them (Matthew 6:28-30 10:29).

But what is perhaps more surprising to many Christians, is that the salvation that Jesus brings includes that natural world. This is because human sin has direct consequences for the rest of creation. After Adam and Eve eat the fruit of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, God says, "cursed is the ground because of you" (Genesis 3:17). The story of Noah's flood is the story of how human sin brings destruction to the whole earth. God recognizes that the animals are blameless in this sin and yet they suffer the consequences, so God commands Noah to ensure that the various species will survive (Genesis 6).

Human sin continues after the flood and so does the natural world's need for redemption from it. In steps Jesus. In John 3:16, the word "world" in the original Greek is literally "*cosmos*."

God so loved the cosmos that he gave his only son that whosoever believes in him shall not die but have life everlasting. Belief is for humans, but the love that sent Jesus is a love that includes the galaxies spinning in deep space. Fulfilling the words of Isaiah, Luke 3:6 proclaims that “all flesh shall see the salvation of the Lord.” The word “flesh” in Greek is “*sarks*,” which refers not only to human flesh, but animal meat, the fleshy part of fruit, and even more generally the physical or natural order of things. Paul writes that natural world knows about Jesus and yearns for human redemption so that all of creation might also be liberated, saying, “For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God.” (Romans 8:19-21). Isaiah gives us a glimpse of what redemption looks like for the natural world in the description of the peaceable kingdom, “The wolf will live with the lamb, the leopard will lie down with the goat, the calf and the lion and the yearling together; and a little child will lead them” (Isaiah 11:6).


Since the natural world also looks to God as Creator, Sustainer, and Redeemer, it should be no surprise that the scriptures speak abundantly of creation singing praises to God just as we do each Sunday morning. The writer of Revelation proclaims, “Then I heard every creature in heaven and on earth and under the earth and on the sea, and all that is in them, saying: ‘To him who sits on the throne and to the Lamb be praise and honor and glory and power, for ever and ever!’” (Revelation 5:13). Even “the mountains and the hills before you shall break forth into singing, and all the trees of the field shall clap their hands” (Isaiah 55:12). We are part of a vast congregation that includes trees, mountains, animals, and even stars, all of which join us in singing God’s praises. And like the members of any congregation, we can learn from them greater faith. Job writes, “But ask the animals, and they will teach you, or the birds in the sky, and they will tell you; or speak to the earth, and it will teach you, or let the fish in the sea inform you. Which of all these does not know that the hand of the LORD has done this? In his hand is the life of every creature and the breath of all mankind” (Job 12:7-12).

We worship a God who not only cares about the natural world, but who in Christ is redeeming creation from human sin. May our faith lead us to participate in the same work of caring for creation. And now that the smoke has begun to clear, I encourage you to spend time in the incredible natural beauty of northern California. When you do, remember that you are in the midst of a grand congregation singing God’s praises. Join in the song.

Dear Members of Faith Lutheran Church,

I can barely see you through the smoke, haze, masks, and social distancing! What a month we've had here in Chico; and a few more challenges face us over the coming weeks. In ways I could never have imagined, I now look forward to our weekly worship services online, the e-Blast that I get from Michael every week; my Zoom meetings with Church Council; and an occasional face-to-face with Pastor Ben and the rest of the staff.


Thank you for your generosity in our Stewardship campaign. Council members and our Stewardship Campaign leaders met with Tri-Path Technology, and we anticipate that work will be able to start on our Sanctuary AV project toward the end of September or early October. This will include sound and video cameras for the sanctuary and a new campus networking project (including robust wi-fi, new wiring, and connections to cable). We are close to having the funds to pay for this important upgrade (about \$95,000 received so far), and we welcome your ongoing commitments and gifts. I am both grateful for your generosity but also not surprised by our progress to our goal. Faith Lutheran Church has always acted decisively in bringing our visions for ministry to life. This is no different than many other projects we have embraced over the years, though it is a tad more costly! In my next letter I hope to be able to announce that all funds for these AV and networking upgrades have been received. With

some luck we will have this system in place by the time we all begin in-person worship in the sanctuary.

You will notice that a few "love letters to Faith Lutheran Church" are starting to appear on our web site. I urge you to take the time to read the notes from former pastors, members, and former members scattered across the country. So many folks that we've known over the years have taken the time to write to us as we move to our next period of life in community and ministry. Their letters remind me of the wonderful work that we have been able to accomplish over the years, and the energy and anticipation that is at play as we move forward. If you enjoy these letters as much as I do, please consider writing and sharing your own with us!

My heartfelt thanks goes out to our amazing staff at FLC. From Pastor Ben to Colter and Luke; from Michael, Jeanette and Lottie to our volunteers like Leo Weiss, Laura Moravec, Musicians, Judy Struck, and the unsung heroes who keep our church going while we worship from afar, I say thank you from the bottom of my heart! NEWS FROM THE OFFICE

Hello Faith! It's been a hot minute since I've seen your faces (well, the parts that aren't covered anyway!) It's a hard to accept that we're surpassing ½ a year of mask-wearing, no in-person worship, and no indoor facility rentals. When you come into the office, you get to check in on the staff and on the campus. Even our "regulars" (musicians, people dropping off offerings, etc.) are in-and-out. I want to take a moment to paint a picture of what things have been like managing the facility and working with the staff during the last 6 months.

When the pandemic started, the staff didn't know what to think. How long were we supposed to suspend in-person worship? How long was this going to last? None of us – and by us, I mean everyone in the country, everyone across the globe – could have grasped the impact Covid would make. And although our staff sometimes needs to make difficult decisions or endure exhausting days, you have given us valuable insights over these last few months that we wouldn't have realized if not for the pandemic.

Patience and support. You reach out to us often, letting us know that we're doing our best and that our effort is appreciated. Sometimes we feel like our work is sloppy, or like we're firing from the hip. We don't intend to be sloppy of course, but when we commit to a decision and have to change it the next day because of unforeseeable reasons like poor air quality, we regret our inability to be consistent. So thank each of you for your patience as we all do our best to encourage one another.

Technological know-how. Each of the staff (and several of you) are learning more than we ever

thought we'd learn about technology. As a result, we're upgrading our A/V system, and all Faith audio and video in the future will have much clearer quality not just throughout the pandemic, but for years, decades after.

Facility care. Many of our staff, council, and members have had more time to poke around the facility and find issues that need addressed. Some things are minor like our lawn needing a little more attention or the windows needing to be cleaned. Others issues, like the roof needing repairs, our lack of a functional A/V system, are larger. Addressing these items has significantly improved the quality of the building, and that includes our new signage, fresh paint on the benches, and our building being power-washed. When we are able to see each other again, I'm confident that you will be pleased with the state of our facility.

As far as my personal work goes, I've been able to tackle several large projects, like building our new website. Our website's resource page (<https://www.chicofaithlutheran.org/about/resources-17>) contains the most up to date *Faith Talks*, *What's Happening at Faith 2020* complete with ministry directory, video resources, Pride Ministry resources, and more. The News and Events on our website are continually being updated, and I guarantee you will find new content every single week.





TRANSFER OF ASYLUM FUNDS TO NORCAL RESIST

The Asylum Team met on August 19th, 2020. The asylum project would require a large network of volunteers to work in close proximity with asylum seekers to meet their physical, emotional, financial, and spiritual needs. After much discussion, thought, and prayer, the Team agreed that during the COVID-19 pandemic, we would be unable to provide this level of support on an on-going basis. The Asylum Team unanimously moved to designate the balance of the Asylum Fund as a donation to NorCal Resist. NorCal Resist is an organization that has had their feet on the ground in Northern California for quite some time and is well-equipped to provide such support during this crisis. In fact, along with a number of other successful programs, they are currently sponsoring and providing housing, support, and legal resources for two asylum seeking families in the Sacramento area.

The Team is confident that its goal of providing for and supporting asylum seekers and migrants in a new land will be carried out by NorCal Resist. We see God's hand in this. Although it is not the outcome we had envisioned, it does represent a different manifestation of the Team's values being carried out by one of its trusted partners.

The Team would like to encourage those interested in supporting asylum seekers and undocumented adults on an ongoing basis to consider donating one time or regularly to NorCal Resist (norcalresist.org/donate). It would also like to thank the many folks who gave time or financial resources towards this cause.

The Asylum team requested church council approval to release the balance of the Asylum Fund to NorCal Resist and it was approved by the council on Sept. 8, 2020.

In an effort to be transparent and keep the Faith Lutheran Community up to speed and in touch with the finances of the Church, this report will be posted in Faith Talks on a monthly basis.

Shown above are the General Fund financial results for the first 2 months of the new fiscal year. The report shows income that was higher than budgeted and expenses that were lower than budgeted. This resulted in the budgeted net loss being less than originally anticipated. A net loss during the summer months is not unusual as it will be made up during the fall and winter months.

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 8, 2020 6:15PM ZOOM

1. Called to order by Joel at 6:15 pm. Devotion was done by Penny Melvin.
2. Opening Prayer—Pr. Ben
3. FLC Council Covenant - Read by all. Joel suggested that council revisit after January 1st to renew the covenant.
4. Approval of minutes from last meeting. Mark approve minutes as presented, Cindy seconded, minutes approved.
5. Announcements and calendar events

Stewardship and Capital Campaign is going well. We continue to receive some sizeable contributions in the early months of the campaign; and many members are stepping up with contributions (from \$5 to \$20,000) and some pledge forms that commit to long-term contributions. We have received approximately \$90,000 in gifts and about \$40,000 in future pledges. All pledges and gifts are being tracked. Bonnie requested that the tithe.ly button be updated to include contributions specifically to the Stewardship campaign.

Council position descriptions Sherrill suggested to add, "Planning for the mission and to maintain the vision of our Faith Lutheran church community". Joel requested that members of council forward ideas and thoughts to him as soon as possible. Goal is to finalize in early 2021.

Maintenance and grounds

- Roof cleaning and some minor repair will proceed in the next week or two.
- Signage should be done shortly.
- Internet and WIFI are up and running from Comcast and phones will port soon.
- Significant challenges with the HVAC system for the sanctuary are being remedied with compressor repair and some work on the electrical main.
- We are seeking to address some continuing homeless challenges on the campus and in the columbarium area, but these do not involve any issues of damage, burglary, etc.

Defibrillator has been installed at the back of the church and Sherill Heinz will be implementing the training and orientation to members.

Use of our facilities by outside groups. The MTANC (music teachers association of Northern California) wants to use our courtyard for some instrument instruction, and that has been approved subject to an MOU with some important restrictions and language included. Sky requested that if someone tests positive for COVID-19 after the event, the organizer is responsible for tracing the origin.

LGBT memorial event in the courtyard on Wednesday 23 September is approved, subject to the usual COVID restrictions.

6. **Financial Report**-Mark Kimmelshue. Income is above budget; however, benevolence was paid in full as well as equipment purchases and repairs and maintenance were greater than the prorated budget. These extra repair and maintenance expenses can be reimbursed by the capital fund if needed. Sky made a motion to approve, Sherrill seconded. Motion passes.

7. **Request to reschedule Council meetings** from second to third Tuesday of each month. An extra week gives our bookkeeper time to close monthly books and for Mark to get the report out to council.

Motion made to make the change by Cindy and seconded by Sherrill. Motion passes.

8. **Worship issues:** Pr. Ben raises issued regarding future worship of our in-person services; however, a drive in service is possible. The concern is the weather and air quality which will mean that there will be a need to run the engine and worsen the air quality. Changes seem to be hourly. Motion made, seconded and passes to go to on line only through October 4th and then further services TBD.

9. **Asylum Committee:** Due to COVID-19 this has become difficult to get off the ground. Recommendation is to donate all funds raised to support the mission of the Asylum committee to NorCal Resist. This non-profit provides legal, financial and emotional support for people seeking asylum in the Sacramento region. If agreed to, the Asylum Committee will stop fundraising. An Eblast, Faith Talks article and the Information will be posted to the website notifying donors of the details.

Motion made to approve transfer of funds raised to NorCal Resist in Sacramento and to put funds to work that is consistent with the Asylum Committee mission. Cindy approved; Bonnie seconded. Motion carried.

10. **Sound, AV, networking of three buildings--update.** A meeting with Staff and members (Colahan, Nickolay, Zimbelman, Tod Kimmelshue, Kim Schweder) was held on 9-8-20 to review the proposal and timeline.

- Original estimates from several months ago were:
Sound: \$76,789 plus Video Streaming: \$35,000 = Total: \$111,789
- Due to our wiring system aging and unable to support various activities, we have had to add a networking component. New updated estimate of costs (including taxes):
Sound: and Video Streaming: \$115,766.03 + Networking: \$26,987 = Total: \$142,744
- Ongoing monthly fees will be \$150, but it will reduce the monthly billing from Comcast.

Our sound system might work without the networking addition, but our video streaming can't go forward without this. This will include the fellowship hall, church offices, room six for video, general wireless on campus that can handle groups. We are very close to having the funds and commitments to cover this; and it will most likely take two or three months before the system can be installed and running.

Motion made to approve the contract at \$142,744 with an addendum for an additional 5 years of training at no additional charge by Joel. Motion seconded by Sky. Motion passed.

11. Signage out front of the church. Reviewed the request to consider new signage out front of church. Council decided to research options and place into the list of capital improvements.
12. Discussion regarding life in the community during the lockdown, and how to strengthen it. Keeping folks connected. Will be tabled until next meeting.
