**PASTOR'S ARTICLE:
LIGHT AND DARK**

Jesus is the light of the world (John 8:12). John's gospel uses the imagery of Jesus as light to explain the ways in which Christ helps us see God and ourselves truly. In this metaphor, darkness becomes negative because it represents where we try to hide from God. As a result, many Christians assume that darkness is inherently bad. But the Bible describes darkness beyond this metaphor in ways that reveal how darkness is also a part of God's good creation.

The first and greatest blessing of darkness comes in the opening lines of the Bible:

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day. -- Genesis 1:1-5

All life begins in the loving darkness of the womb. This is true for humans, who spend our first 9 months in the loving darkness of our mother's womb. This is true for all animal life on earth, which both scripture and evolutionary science agree began in the sea (Genesis 1:20). And this is true on a cosmic scale: the initial explosion of light that marks the beginning of the universe is born out of formless void and darkness. The darkness of deep space is the womb from which God brought forth the cosmos.

It is the interplay between light and dark that God uses to order the universe, mark time, and give meaning to our days. The consequences of this truth are both social and personal.

On a social level, being able to celebrate the blessing of darkness is essential for proclaiming the gospel in this moment in history. When Europeans began settling the Americas and enslaved both indigenous and African peoples on a vast scale, part of the rhetoric Christians used to justify this slavery was by labeling Europeans as "light" and African and indigenous peoples as "dark." This type of labeling of people continues to this day.

But whereas 17th century Europeans insisted that “light = good,” and “dark = bad,” we know that in Christ all races and ethnicities are united as one holy people. So long as people are described as “light” or “dark,” Christ’s gospel requires us to affirm that both light and dark are good, holy, and a blessing.

Seeing the sacred in darkness is also essential on a personal level. As the days get shorter, seeing darkness as a negative becomes overwhelming when over half our day is darkness. But if we can learn to see the darkness as a blessing from God, suddenly these dark winter days can become for us a loving womb from which new life is waiting to be born.



Throughout Advent, we will be exploring the blessings of darkness in scripture and our lives. Though due to Covid, we will not be sharing soup suppers, the first three Wednesdays in December we hold Holden Evening Prayer services in-person at 7pm. Each of these services will focus on the theme of “the loving darkness of the womb” by examining the four women named in Jesus’ genealogy and how darkness was a blessing for each of them. Our sanctuary will also be decorated throughout Advent to help us see the

beauty in darkness and ponder how God might use darkness to birth new life into our lives. I encourage you to read our Worship and Music Director’s Article for more on those decorations.

Finally, on Christmas Eve, we will once again have our outdoor living nativity in the afternoon, but this year we will also return to our 9pm candlelight service live and in the sanctuary.

Advent is a time to ponder, like Mary, what it means to be pregnant with Christ, what it means to wait and prepare to give birth to Jesus. May the darkness this Advent be for you a blessing, an invitation to slow down, curl up, and feel God hold you close in the loving darkness of the womb.



It seems like just yesterday I was preparing my article for Thanksgiving and letting everyone know what we'd be up to for the holidays. The month of November has now come and gone. It seems as though each month is creative and exciting in a new way.



As we head into Advent we prepare for the birth of Christ and what a joyous time that is! However, this season I want us to think of Advent in a different way. The story of Christ's birth is one, at its core, that brings great joy to all. The story, however, is a tough one and a journey with many trials and tribulations. Firstly, we see Mary being shunned by many because of the circumstances of her pregnancy, there is then no room for them at the inn and the baby is birthed in a barn, and to top it all off, they must flee from the king who is

SPIRITUAL GIFTS PART IV: EVANGELISM

The word "evangelism" comes from two Greek words, *eu* (meaning "good") and *aggelos* (meaning "messenger"). Evangelism is literally sharing good news. The good that we have as Christians to share with people is that they are loved unconditionally by God, have a place forever in Jesus' family, and are empowered by the Holy Spirit to change this world for the better. The good news is incredibly simple, the challenge is how to share it in a way that people believe it.

When you want to let the people who are important in your life know that you love them, how do you go about it? Do you say, "I love you," as the person walks past, and then never interact with them again? I certainly hope not! Conversely, do you wake up early each morning ready to care for all the person's needs, but never actually say the words, "I love you?" If so, I very much hope you someday say those words out loud. As much as caring acts are essential to loving someone, we all yearn to hear those words of love spoken to us. The same is true with evangelism, with sharing the good news of God's love in Christ, it must be done with both words and deeds.

True evangelism is more than standing on street corners holding signs saying "John 3:16," and it is more than providing material help for people in need. Evangelism is loving people through our actions and telling them the source of our love is Jesus, who loves them also, who knows all their sins and faults and yet has chosen them to transform the world. Sometimes evangelism is done by listening to someone's troubles, holding their hands and praying with them to the God who loves them. Sometimes evangelism is done by giving food to a hungry person, and then sitting with them, listening to their story, and saying "why don't you come join me at church on Sunday?"

Sometimes evangelism happens in a classroom, when we examine all reasons people think they or others don't deserve love, belonging, or empowerment, and then studying scripture to discover how Jesus demolishes all those reasons.

“Learning is a life-time undertaking,” says Joel Zimbelman, who has been teaching Faith Adult Christian Education classes for many years, “and the focus of FACE classes over the many decades has been to equip the Saints (and our guests) with an appreciation what the Gospel teaches and the ways in which its truths can nurture and shape our everyday lives. We have always tried to choose topics, books, devotional activities, and speakers who were great conversation starters, had something important to share, and who could help ignite creative ways of making the Gospel come alive for our members. That mission of building up the body in love and community will continue in the coming years as our adult classes move back to Faith’s Fellowship Hall!”

Each and every follower of Jesus is called to be an evangelist, to share the good news of Christ in word and deed, but some people are given a special gift from the Holy Spirit for this ministry. Do you see someone who is hurting, and yearn to let them know they are loved? Do you hear people talking disparagingly about themselves and want to stop-up their mouth and fill their ears with all the reasons they are wonderful? Do you see a stranger all alone, and think to yourself, "here's a chance to make someone feel special?" If so, perhaps the Holy Spirit has given you the gift of evangelism. May you use it to bless this world.

**COMANCHE CREEK:
VOICES FROM THE GREENWAY**

The North State Shelter Team recently celebrated the 35th weekend in a row of cleanups that have focused on helping remove trash from Comanche Creek. Working in collaboration with Faith Lutheran Church and other community volunteers, the North State Shelter Team has spent time on Sunday afternoons cleaning up the greenway and getting to know the campers. Charles Withuhn of the North State Shelter Team said that over the 35 weekends, the work is starting to pay off. “There was a time it didn’t look like we’d made any progress. There were piles of trash everywhere, but we just keep plugging away at it and now it’s actually better.”

This milestone also marked 35 weekends of helping the people living at Comanche Creek. “This is 35 Sundays in a row we’ve shown up and handed out fire extinguishers, first aid kits, sandwiches, sundries with toothbrushes and soap, and socks and some clothes,” Withuhn said. “We make friends. We cruise Comanche and go up to the campers and offer to haul away their trash. They’re really grateful. We get a lot of ‘thank-yous’. These people are isolated. They’re folks that don’t have family. And that happens because of domestic violence, because of divorce, because of the death of a breadwinner, because of having health issues. A lot of people are alienated from their families. And so because they have no fallback position, they end up in the bushes.”



I personally have gotten to know many of the campers at Comanche Creek over the past 8 months. It has been a humbling experience to hear their stories and to be thanked for “treating me like a real person.” Two of those individuals are Jason and Tona and they have given me permission to share their stories.

Jason’s Story: Jason is 47 and came to Chico from Redding after losing his job in retail due to the pandemic. Jason said when his unemployment ran out, he was not able to keep up with the rent. “I lost everything. I had no income, couldn’t find work; resources for the homeless were very

limited so I moved to Chico.” Jason has lived at Comanche Creek for the past 18 months. “I know that people think all homeless people are drug users who don’t want to work; we’re not! We all have a different story. I hope to get a full-time job and get a house someday. It’s hard to apply for work when you don’t have an address or the ability to take a shower or put on clean clothes every day - who’s going to hire me like this?” Jason told me, “I keep my campsite clean and appreciate the volunteers who come out to help us. The city only provides one dumpster so there is no place to put the trash. That’s why I help out every Sunday picking up trash. Because we’re all struggling out here.” Jason added that, “What does help with the struggle of being homeless is the help from volunteers. There’s a lot of people that come out here and give us food, clothing, and things like toothbrushes and toothpaste. In return, I try to help others in the same boat as I am.”

Tona’s Story: Tona is 55, a life-long resident of Butte County and has lived at Comanche Creek for about 2 years. “I lost my home in the Camp Fire and we ended up on the streets of Oroville for about 4 months until my fiancé assaulted me, rolled me up in a tarp and set me on fire.” Tona said that after her release from the hospital she went to Catalyst but unable to find permanent housing, ended up back on the streets. Tona told me that she “Worked for over 30 years as an In-Home Supportive Services worker helping seniors, however she is no longer able to work due to late on-set epilepsy.” Tona has no income. She recycles and repairs bicycles for spare change. Tona said, “As a single women, it’s scary as hell living at Comanche creek. I’ve seen 4 of my friends die. People don’t even see us - they don’t see us! That makes me feel horrible. I’m afraid to leave my tent after dark. This is not the life I wanted; this is the life I have. I’m not living, I’m surviving, not living, surviving!” Tona added, “I hope to be able to get off the street someday, I hope to get my Social Security. I really appreciate the volunteers who come out to help us, their actions tell me, you are not invisible, you are not a burden.”

MAINTAINING OUR CHURCH BUILDINGS

Our committee has been busy over the past few months taking care of our building and grounds. We have accomplished a lot, but have many projects in the works!

We replaced four air conditioning units (three in the sanctuary and one in the church office) that were inefficient or not working. Some of those units were over 30 years old, so we really got our money out of them!

Our water bills have been high, and we are fixing broken pipes and sprinklers, as well as exploring upgrades to our irrigation system and some new landscaping. More details to follow as we work with Cal Water to solve our problems.

Lighting in the Fellowship Hall, kitchen, and bathrooms is outdated and uneven. We'll be upgrading lots of these lights in the next few months to provide more consistent coverage, good color, and safety.

We have been working with the Fire Marshall to keep our building up to code. We will need to replace the outdated fire suppression system over our kitchen stove. We will try to have that done in December.

As we prepare to return to regular Sunday coffee time, Janine Rush and others have purchased new coffee machines and service. We will be installing a new water filter in the kitchen to make sure our coffee tastes as good as what you have at home.

We are exploring an update to our campus security system with door and window security, as well as a few cameras on the property.

As funds become available through the Stewardship Campaign, we will be working with a contractor to convert the bathroom in the nursery into a fully handicapped-accessible sink and toilet. This will provide us with bathroom access separate from our main building, increase security on our campus, and meet the needs of visiting groups who use our classrooms.

Start time on this project (and the accompanying renovation of the nursery) will depend on how quickly we can raise financial support from our members.

Our playground equipment was power washed and the bark was raked and cleaned by the Boy Scouts. Shortly, we will order ten cubic yards of playground bark for delivery, and kids will be able to safely play on this equipment once again.

Safety on our campus is always a concern. Starting in January, we will hold occasional safety meetings for staff, guest users, and members to orient them to the use of our facilities, procedures we have for safe use of our equipment, and who to contact when an emergency arises. Stay tuned: if you are reading this, we're likely to invite you to one of these 30-minute sessions!

Finally, let Joel know if you are interested in being part of a campus cleanup day after Christmas. We need to take care of some exterior, roof, and interior maintenance chores; organ oiling, window cleaning, and tree pruning. Nothing major, but many hands make for quick work!

Global Giving Tree



This December, the Season of Giving, look for our Global Giving Tree in the Sanctuary. This tree will be adorned with ornaments, each a service opportunity in which to support the ELCA on a global level. These donations go to purchase water taps to outfit families in Nepal with clean water; broods of chicks for farmers; fish for ponds, or even entire startup ponds for farmers/fisherman in Cambodia; sewing machines for sewers in Sudan; and so, so much more all over the world! Gifts start at \$10, and there are a variety to choose from. The Giving Tree will be made available at our Advent Workshop on Saturday, December 4th and will stay throughout most of December.

As we transition into the holidays, seasonal giving is starting to trickle in. In November, \$165 was donated so that we could purchase pies for Chico Housing Action Team’s Thanksgiving. 65 pies were purchased and given out prior to Thanksgiving. The Disaster Relief fund received \$100 this last month, and \$192 of Joseph Project money was used to purchase room and board for an individual who would otherwise have no place to sleep. Food donations were given by members of Faith for the Hunger Trolley, who on November 12th, were able to provide two meals to over 36 people at Comanche Creek.
