PASTOR'S ARTICLE: HOLY SATURDAY 2020



This should be the article in which I tell you about all the wonderful services which we have planned for Holy Week and Easter. But I cannot. As I write this article, the State of California is still under mandatory shelter-in-place. I honestly do not yet know if we will be able to gather in person for Holy Week or what the services will look like.

Yet this is not the first time our community has been upended in recent history. For many, the sense of uncertainty, the school closures, and even the wearing of N95 masks bring back haunting reminders of the Camp Fire. More than one person has asked me, "have we not suffered enough already?"

And yet this year's crisis is different from last year's. The fire brought a fast trauma; the pain, the destruction, and even the wounds were immediately visible. As people lost their homes and their congregations, we opened our doors and crowded close together. How different the Coronavirus is. This trauma has been creeping upon us, slowly; the pathogen invisible. The pain and the destruction have yet to be fully seen; the wounds that will come from this are yet to be imagined. Instead of opening our doors to our neighbors, we close them, and keep our distance.

Last year as a community, we experienced Good Friday. This year, we are living Holy Saturday. Good Friday shows us the clear and obvious pain of the crucifixion. Raised up on the cross, Jesus' suffering and death is visible to all, and he even tells us when it is over, saying, "it is finished" (John 19:30). How different Holy Saturday is! We do not have a worship service for Holy Saturday. There is nothing to see, nothing to do. There is simply a tomb whose door is closed shut with a stone. There are no words of comfort from Jesus, no promise that this too shall pass. There is simply a tomb whose door is closed shut with a stone.

At least, that's all that we see. But of course, Jesus sees differently. Because while from the outside the tomb it appears nothing is happening, inside the tomb Jesus is very busy. In the Nicene and Apostles' Creed, we confess that "Jesus was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead (or into Hell, depending on your translation)." On Holy Saturday Jesus descends into the depths of Hell. And what does he do there? He leads the universe's greatest jailbreak. 1 Peter 3:18-19 states, "For Christ also

suffered once for sins, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God. He was put to death in the body but made alive in the Spirit. After being made alive, he went and made proclamation to the imprisoned spirits." On Holy Saturday, Jesus descends into the depths of Hell to proclaim the good news even to the dead. Having proclaimed their freedom from death and sin, Jesus leads the dead to new and eternal life so that he might triumphantly fill heaven with newly redeemed saints (Ephesians 4:8-10). Theologians call Jesus entering into hell to rescue the dead, "The Harrowing of Hell." Matthew describes this process saying, "The earth shook, the rocks split and the tombs broke open. The bodies of many holy people who had





died were raised to life. They came out of the tombs after Jesus' resurrection and went into the holy city and appeared to many people" (Matthew 27:51-53).

From outside the tomb we may see and hear only the stillness and silence, but on Holy Saturday, Jesus enters the bowels of death to defeat it from the inside. So it is for us now during this Holy Saturday that stretches on for weeks. From outside the church building we may see and hear only stillness and silence, but on the inside of our hearts, the Body of Christ, the true church, is battling the forces of separation, loneliness and death. Inside of homes, we are connecting with one another online for Bible Studies, Centering Prayer, Holden Evening Prayer, and Sunday worship. We are calling each other to check in, to speak words of encouragement, share knowledge and laughter. We are delivering groceries to those for whom it is dangerous or difficult to go to the store. In a world shrouded by death, we are

living out the gospel and following Jesus as he leads us to life.

After Jesus finishes his work on Holy Saturday, he rolls away the stone in front of the tomb and steps out once more into the land of the living. When he does so, Mary Magdalene doesn't recognize

him (John 20:15). Jesus's appearance has changed since before he went into the tomb. But as soon as he calls her name, Mary recognizes that even though he looks different, the Jesus she loves is still the same.

I don't know when we'll be able to roll away the stone from quarantine and step out once more into the world together, but I know Easter is coming. I know that we will celebrate it together in one form or another. We may not look exactly the same as before we entered this time of quarantine, but Jesus will still call our name, and we will hear the voice of savior calling us to new and eternal life.

THE TRIP REPORT: SACRAMENTO NTL. WILDLIFE REFUGE

Welcome to the twelfth edition of The Trip Report, a monthly briefing on youth and intergenerational events. This month, I will share about a nature walk with Faith Lutheran's youth through part of the Sacramento National Wildlife Refuge.

Adaptability is a key mindset for anyone doing youth ministry, but I found myself having to really think on my toes when implementing our most recent youth trip. We had planned to go to the Pine Creek unit of the Sacramento National Wildlife Refuge on St. Patrick's Day for a fun scavenger hunt. With all of the clues planned out and Sarah Van Dusen enthusiastic about setting them out ahead of time, I was sure we had another great youth trip set and ready to go.

Things changed rapidly due to COVID-19 during that weekend, and I found myself wondering if it would be best to cancel the event altogether. Was it safe to have all the youth around each other? I asked myself. However, the more I thought about it, the more I knew that getting out of the house was just the thing for a group of teenagers stuck inside. And, I knew we could still do the event in a way that was safe for everyone. So, I put out the word to the parents involved, and then showed up at the Refuge with a slightly different plan in mind the next day.

It was raining, and the wind was blowing. The youth began to arrive, and I quickly established the rules for the event: stay 6 feet apart from people who you don't live at home with, no matter what. I was pleased to see that all of our group members were dressed for the weather and were in good spirits for our nature walk. We prayed in a comically large circle, and then we hit the trail. Instead of looking for clues, we were in search of whatever natural wonder would be out on the trail.



I enjoyed chatting with Kortney and Jon Stafford as Lily, Mason, and Kendall walked ahead on the trail. We stopped to examine some tracks in the mud: a raccoon, several dogs, maybe a mountain lion (we couldn't be sure). The rain seemed to pick up a bit, but our group was undeterred.

As the trail continued out into an open clearing, I stopped to look at some birds circling overhead. Perhaps an eagle in the mix, along with some vultures? I asked Jon. He agreed.

As we continued further down the trail, we kept talking about times we enjoyed being outside in the past, and exciting encounters we had with wildlife. It was fun to swap stories and share in fellowship.

About halfway through our walk, I stopped the group to practice one of my favorite breathing exercises: breathing the square. In order to do this, it's important to find a good position, either sitting or standing, so your lungs can fully expand. Then, breathe in while counting to four, hold your breath and count to four, exhale for four counts, and then hold your exhale for four counts. I reminded the youth that no matter what was happening for them, or whatever emotions they might be feeling, they can always take time to breathe.

Further ahead on the trail, we spotted a man-made tower supporting an osprey nest. There was an osprey's head sticking out of it. I stopped the group to point out the bird of prey, who took off from the nest and landed in a nearby cottonwood tree. I shared with the group that osprey mating pairs will build the nest together, and while rearing their chicks, the male will do the hunting while the female watches the nest. The successful hunter will eat the nutrient-rich fish heads before giving the rest to the family: fatty brains provide enough sustenance for the male. I asked the youth if that was how things worked in their family too, and they all rolled their eyes.

By the time the walk was over, I wanted to keep going! We had enjoyed such a nice time together observing the natural world and being in fellowship with each other. I was reminded of how simple ministry can be, and how a little time outside can do a lot of good. As we prayed together and departed (all while staying safely away from each other), I said an extra prayer for the youth and their families, and for the area we had been privileged to walk through. As I shut my car door to drive away, I could hear the osprey calling from the nest, as if to say "Until next time!"



COUNCIL MINUTES

February 18, 2020

Present: Mark Kimmelshue, Susan Kimball, Sherrill Heinz, Ben Colahan, Meredith Woods, Diane Knight Joel Zimbelman

Absent: Cindy Kampf, Sky Sample & Tricia Homesley


The meeting began with a devotional and opening prayer led by Pastor Ben.

- 1. The meeting began with a prayer lead by Pastor Ben and a devotional read by Joel on the "World & the Church".
- 2. The covenant was read by all attendees.
- 3. **Minutes from January 21, 2020** were reviewed and approved as written.
- 4. **Financial reports through January 31, 2020** were presented by Mark. There was some concern that the weekly attendance count has been off. It was proposed that we try to have two sets of counts to compare each week.
- 5. Campus updates
- a. **Signage** is in process and should be installed in March.
- b. **Campus Security** The incident rate of security issues has increased therefore Joel is researching companies to provide foot patrol of the grounds at minimum once per evening.
- c. **Upgrade of offices** Laura Moravec is putting out to bid the following tasks.
 - i. Painting of the former library and new meeting rooms
 - ii. New carpet
- d. **Kitchen stove** has been cleaned, the walls in the kitchen have been painted and the stove will be installed within the next two days.
- 6. Request to reimburse **moving expenses for Luke**. Proposal was for \$6,408. After discussion Susan made the motion to approve at \$4,158, Sherrill seconded and motion was approved.
- 7. Mission Statement
- a. Pastor Ben just returned from attending sessions at the Rockwood leadership institute. There he was asked "what is your purpose" and proposed that this is exactly what our mission statement should reflect. Three highlights:
 - i. Want to give to others a sense of love & community
 - ii. Be intentional about how we invite everyone into our Faith community
 - iii. Small groups to meet and create a strong relationship
- b. Joel presented 8 pages of submitted mission statements by council members. Each was discussed then everyone took 20 minutes to pick three favorites and rewrite. Each member was requested to present their rewrites. - 8. **Sound system** Joel presented the TriPath Technology Group quote for the new sound system. The quote was reviewed and after much discussion it was decided that this is what is needed to do the job right the first time. There are other deferred maintenance issues that need to be addressed. It was decided that council will walk the campus and put together a list of these items, seek estimates and compile a complete list to take the congregation. Mark stated that he would talk with Thrivent to see if there is any assistance and Pastor Ben will look into the Mission Development Fund.
