

PASTOR'S ARTICLE: CHANGES in the CHURCH OFFICE

You may have noticed there have been some changes in the church office! We are in the midst of reconfiguring the offices with three goals in mind: 1) Better communication and collaboration between staff, 2) more and better meeting spaces for the congregation, 3) improving the relevancy of our books.

In Kevin's final week at Faith, the Search Team interviewed him both about his recommendations in what to look for in a new Director of Worship and Music, but also in how we as a congregation could better support the next Director of Worship and Music. One of Kevin's suggestions that most surprised me was to reconfigure the staff offices. He noted that our current layout created a separation between me as the pastor and the rest of the staff and felt it resulted in missed opportunities for collaboration. As I reflected on his comments, I realized there was truth in them. It's not so much that the distance between the pastor's office and the rest of the staff is vast, it's that there are literal obstacles in the way of us seeing each other. I will admit that one of the obstacles is my personality. In the current arrangement, to see the other staff, I must walk past the front desk. There are inevitably wonderful people from our congregation checking in with Michael when I walk past and I want to stop and check in with these folks. It is a blessing to see the people, but suddenly, what was supposed to be a 5 minute conversation with Colter, has turned into a 15 minute conversation with someone who stopped by to pick up a poster. As a result, I have noticed in myself that I sometimes hide in my office instead of walking out to chat with the staff on a topic. But more than that, there is a truth to the saying, "Out of sight, out of mind." Particularly with Kevin, there were days when I simply wouldn't see him. We were both in the office, but he entered through a separate door and had no reason to pass by my office. Part of the magic of working with people comes in the moments when we bump into each other while we are thinking of something else, and excitedly share what's inspiring us. My hope is this new configuration will do just that: encourage Colter, Luke, and myself to bump into each other, to poke our heads around the corner to share what's inspiring us in the moment, to wander into each other's office to ask for advice. Hopefully you will see the fruit of this in worship, when our praise, our children, and the sermon intertwine to give deeper richness to all three.


A second benefit of the reconfiguration is to provide more and better meeting spaces. More often Faith is having multiple meetings happening at the same time. Currently the library is the one space that feels both comfortable and professional. The goal is to create two spaces with that feeling. The first space would be in Kevin's former office. This would be a large conference room with a single table around which up to 16 people could fit. The second would be in Colter's old office. This room would be a smaller room designed for intimate conversations with no more than 6 people. As we transition, we will also be putting in new carpet and a fresh coat a paint to spruce up the spaces and give them a cozier feel. Ultimately, we'd like install a wall-mounted easy to use TV/computer in the large conference room for classes and video-conferencing.


The final benefit is to improve the relevancy of our books. The library had an incredible collection of books. And yet they were very rarely checked out. Part of the reason is that most people don't go into our library, and part of the reason is that when they were in the library, they were there for a meeting, not to peruse books. Our plan is select the books that we think are most use and place them where people will be most likely to think about their topic. For instance, we've selected what we think are the best of our children's books and moved them to the nursey. We selected what we think are the best of the books on the bible and Christian history, and we will move them to the large

conference room where bible study will take place. We selected the best books related to spiritual care topics, like grief and prayer, and we will put them in the small meeting room where those intimate conversations will happen. The goal is, when people see books, they will see just the books they need in that moment. Hopefully, that will encourage people to take the books home and read them.

Laura Moravec and Joel Zimbelman have already done a great job of assembly a crew of folks from Faith to start these transitions. It will likely be a few more weeks before they are all finished. Thank you ahead of time for your patience as we renovate, and I encourage you to keep your eyes open for the improvements in staff collaboration, meeting spaces, and books catching your attentions.


Sacristans

The list of things to do goes on and on mainly, we believe, by the direction of the Holy Spirit but also the contagious enthusiasm of team members.


PROPERTY and FACILITIES MANAGEMENT

THE TRIP REPORT: INTERGENERATIONAL SNOWSHOEING NEAR LASSEN VOLCANIC NATIONAL PARK

Welcome to the twelfth edition of The Trip Report, a monthly briefing on youth and intergenerational events. This month, I will share about a recent intergenerational snowshoe trip in Lassen National Forest.

I'm no stranger to a little snow. I grew up in the mountains, skiing and ice fishing and hiking during the coldest months of the year. Snow has a way of transforming a landscape into something magnificent and quiet. Spending time in the snow has a way of transforming our attitudes as well.

However, it's not every person that feels as comfortable around the white fluffy stuff as I do. With that in mind, I once again penciled in a snowshoe trip up by Lassen as one of our monthly youth/intergenerational events, in hopes that a few snow "rookies" would be game to trust me to lead them on a journey. As the day of the trip got closer, the sign up list grew longer and the excitement was building.



We met in the church parking lot on a Saturday morning and loaded all of our snow gear and snowshoe equipment into vehicles. As Ralph Godwin mentioned to me, snowshoe technology has improved quite a bit since the days of fur trappers and mountain men. Aluminum and PVC have replaced hardwoods and leather. I'm grateful for these modern advances, which make snowshoeing less clumsy and tiresome. The forecast promised rain, but thankfully it wasn't supposed to start until the afternoon. Our drive from Chico to the snowshoe area was pleasant (I rode with Penny and Tom Melvin and Vicki Doeden), and the roads were dry. Some very light rain began to fall as we neared the parking lot, but it wasn't heavy and it wasn't terribly unpleasant.

Once we arrived at our trailhead, I remarked to Pastor Ben how different the place looked with a bit less snow than last year. He replied, "This is definitely a different place than where we went last year," and after further investigation, he was indeed correct. However, the trail looked doable and we had the place to ourselves, so we decided to try this new location.

Folks began piling out of their vehicles and putting on all manner of winter attire. With everyone looking suited for a couple of hours in the snow, I did a brief safety talk and overview of snowshoe technique with the group. Then, everyone picked out their snowshoes, which were in a row according to each snowshoe pair's surface area. I was pleased to see that we had enough snowshoes for everyone, and that everyone had snowshoes that fit them well.

With explicit instructions to leave the clean, unmarred cross country ski tracks alone, our crew promptly tramped all over them and made a mess of the trail. I suppose some instructions are worth saying several times over, and I prayed future skiers at this site would forgive us for our trail transgressions.

I hit my stride alongside Nelson and Sandra Hayashida, whose granddaughter Lili'u was far ahead on the trail with one of her friends, Dela, from school. Both Nelson and Sandra had never tried snowshoeing before, but they were naturals! I enjoyed getting to know them, both having journeyed throughout the U.S. to some spectacular mountains I have never been to before, like the Teton Range. Nelson described seeing the massive mountains reflected on a perfectly still lake. I hope one day to go see this myself!

Further ahead on the trail, I caught up with Ryan Manes, his son James, and his daughter Hope. Both of his children were having a blast, throwing snowballs and blazing their own trails alongside the main road. I felt they really understood the amazement of snowshoeing: where once they would have sunk through the snow to the ground, they could walk! James made friends with Lili'u and Dela, and their laughter could be heard echoing throughout the forest as they played in the snow. For such a young snowshoer, I was impressed with how far Hope was able to go. Her resilient attitude and excitement for an adventure brought me new life.



After some time, members of our party began to turn around and make their way downhill, back to the vehicles for some lunch. I pulled out my large thermos of hot chocolate, and Pastor Ben and Annalisa Koch added their cocoa thermos to the mix as well. Between all of us, there was enough sweet chocolatey goodness for everyone to have a cup. What a great thing to share! And, the cocoa wasn't the only thing being shared. Nelson and Sandra brought some delicious spam musubi with them, which includes the usual ingredients for sushi but replaces the fish with spam instead. It was delicious! Ryan gave me a few pieces of homemade jerky, which was also quite tasty. Sharing food with one another, in a community with a wide range of ages, and after all of us had worked up an appetite, was one of the best parts of the day.

With rain looming and the small droplets becoming a bit larger, our group opted to skip the second hike after lunch and return home instead. Tom drove us back to Chico safely, and Ryan met me at Mountain Sports with the snowshoes and poles in the back of his truck. Wet, tired, and happy, I returned home, giving thanks to God for a wonderful day in the mountains!

COUNCIL MINUTES

January 21, 2020

Present: Sky Sample, Mark Kimmelshue, Susan Kimball, Sherrill Heinz, Ben Colahan, Meredith Woods, Diane Knight & Tricia Homesley. Absent: Joel Zimbelman

- 1. The meeting began with a devotional and opening prayer led by Pastor Ben.
- 2. The covenant was read by all attendees.
- 3. **Minutes from Nov. 11, 2019** were reviewed. Motion made to approve as written and carried.
- 4. **Financial reports through 12-31-19** were presented by Mark. Funds are being earmarked for the new signage around the campus.
- 5. Janine Rush, Margaret McMillan and Bill Kees made a presentation for **the Director of Worship & Music**. They discussed that they had narrowed down the search to two strong candidates and after conversation and reflection recommended that we call Luke who currently resides in Laurence, Kansas. His anticipated start date will be around Feb. 24th. The search committee had determined that there were five points for critical success:
 - a. The search team has made a commitment to walk with Luke for the first 12 to 18 months.
 - b. Create a strong community surrounding him to help guide him.
 - c. Margaret & Bill will work closely with him on liturgical.
 - d. The team would like to send him to So. CA to talk with Kevin for a couple of days.
 - e. Enter a verbal 5-year commitment & increase education.

After conversation Susan made the motion to offer the position to Luke. Sherrill seconded the motion and motion carried. Everyone thanked the search team for all the time and effort.

- 6. Additional updates
 - a. **Signage** is in process and a mockup will be completed shortly.
 - b. **Safe Space** The Safe Space staff is responsible for setup, cooking, cleanup, monitoring, etc. Colter will meet Safe Space each evening and lockup in the mornings.
 - c. **Campus security** will begin after Safe Space and will walk the facility one time each evening.
- 7. **Mission Statement** will be tabled until out next council meeting due to the length of time spent with the call committee.


