

#### **PASTOR'S ARTICLE**







Though there is nothing particularly sacred or biblical about the 1<sup>st</sup> of January, it's as a good a time as any to reflect on how life has been going and what we hope for the future. So let me share with you my own reflection.

I am incredibly fortunate. 2019 once again reminds me of the goodness in my life. At home, I am continually amazed that I have a house to call my own, that I get to live in this beautiful city, and that Annalisa has chosen to share her life with me. At work, I get to collaborate with a caring and passionate team made up of both staff and dedicated lay leaders. I get to serve a congregation of people who support one another, who live out the gospel in our community, and who continually inspire me with their faith.

Of all this goodness that God has seen fit to bring into in my life, it is this last one that I personally want to focus on in the year to come. I am often asked how I keep up my spirit and strength when I go to visit people who are sick, dying, or grieving. My response is always the same: by visiting those people who are sick, dying, or grieving. The truth is that you are the well from which I draw my faith. The ways in which you acknowledge your fears and yet put them in God's hands, the ways in which you grieve those who have died and yet proclaim the resurrection, these are the ways Jesus gives me strength.

I have said before how much I benefit from the process of writing sermons. I have said before how important it is that you all also have the opportunity to proclaim what God has done for you. This past year I have made a point to incorporate more of your stories into my sermons. It has been a joy to share the ways that the Spirit is at work when Jim Kirks gives Jacquie a ride to church (or forgets), or when Ruth Coutts give Arlene Button her eye drops. I have made a point to invite members of the congregation to preach when I am away. And we've been blessed to hear words of comfort and hope as Cindy Kampf reminded us that God's language can be as simple as a smile and Kellie Marie Lavin bravely admitted the ways in which she wants to plan every aspect of her life and is learning to trust that God's plans are always greater than hers. But I feel called to do more, to lift up more voices in our midst that speak of the mighty deeds that God has done right here in Chico.

So here is my resolution for 2020: Each month, at least one sermon will center around how the Spirit is working in the life of a member of our congregation. This might take a variety of forms: some months I may get permission to tell someone else's story, some months I may work with the person so that they themselves can preach. But I imagine what will be most common is a style of sermon in which I interview folks, asking them pre-planned questions to draw out their story and then I can intersperse biblical connections and commentary.

I'm going to start this resolution three days early. On December 29<sup>th</sup>, 2019, Nola Dosch has agreed to let me interview her for the sermon. I won't give anything away, but let's just say Nola's life is truly a modern tale of Jesus' birth in ways that humbled and awed me when I heard how God had worked through her family. I am grateful that she is willing to share her story with us. I can only live out this resolution with your help. And so I will ask you to consider a resolution for the new year also. Many of you already share with me what God is doing in your life; this coming year, when I call you up and ask if you'd be willing to share those same stories with the congregation, consider saying yes. It will require great vulnerability and great strength, but I have found that when we are willing to be vulnerable Christ becomes our strength. In Christ you have the power to give comfort to the grieving, hope to the despairing. You have the power to inspire and transform lives. I know, because you do so for me every day. Please share that power with the world.

#### THE YOUTH TRIP REPORT: ADVENT WORKSHOP

Welcome to the eleventh edition of The Trip Report, a monthly briefing on youth and intergenerational events. This month, I will share about the 2019 Advent Workshop.

I grew up in Missoula, Montana, and attended Immanuel Lutheran Church from the time I was born until I left for college. One of my favorite things we did every year around Christmas at Immanuel was the annual cookie workshop. I loved the smells, eating cookies, getting to spend time with folks older than me, and having the lowkey space to chat. Last year when I found out that Faith Lutheran also does a workshop in Advent, I was skeptical. Could it live up to all of the good times I had known from workshops past in Montana?

Preparation for Faith Lutheran's Advent Workshop happens months in advance. Susan Reed gets on the phone and calls up all sorts of folks who usually show up and play a part: the musicians, the crafters, the bakers, the candlestick makers (just kidding). This year, we put the call out to the congregation, asking them to lead a craft or two during the workshop. We also decided to advertise a chili cookoff, hoping that the promise of bean-filled glory would lure some otherwise nonparticipatory folks to join in the fun.

I arrived at the parish hall on the day of the workshop and greeted Sue and Kelly Tipton. Kelly was busy setting up the wreath-making table, and Sue promptly sent me away to go buy some last-minute construction paper. After acquiring the needed paper, I made it back to the church. Craft leaders had arrived and were setting up



their tables with examples, instructions, and materials. The cookie-decorating table had a large plastic tub filled with cookies and tubs of frosting. I tried one (or maybe two) to make sure they were up to snuff, and indeed they were. Before we knew it, folks were arriving to take part in the workshop. There were so many kids! More importantly, the kids were having fun and didn't look bored in the slightest. The "slime" station was a favorite, as was the rockpainting station. Several helpful youngsters approached me and offered to decorate for me a "personally customized" Christmas cookie. Who was I to refuse?! I tried to ignore the mounting mental tally of "cookies consumed"...



I headed over to the sanctuary to provide some direction for an enthusiastic group of folks who agreed to beautify the church for Advent and Christmas. The hanging of the greens was happening once again. With boxes unloaded from the attic, strands of lights checked, and Chrismans shimmering with sequins, we began hanging the lighted greenery along the perimeter of the sanctuary and putting up the large Christmas tree. A large thanks are in order to Ralph Godwin who braved the dizzying heights of our tallest ladder to place ornaments on the tree.

A few of my friends arrived to do some crafting, so I let our industrious crew in the sanctuary continue with their good work. One

of my favorite parts of the Advent Workshop is how accessible it is for non-church folks: participants just get to show up and make crafts and hang out. For folks like my friends, this is a great way to spend time at church without any expectations, and get to be a part of our warm community. My buddy Drew and his girlfriend Bridgette made a beautiful wreath with Kelly's help. Bridgette brought her niece, Norah, and Norah had a great time too. When I saw her she was pounding down a cup of hot cider and heading to the next table to make another craft. As per usual, our musicians did a fabulous job playing Christmas classics for all to enjoy. Their Christmas attire and silly hats brought a smile to everyone. I'm always impressed with the quality of musicians who find their home at Faith. We certainly have some exceptional talent in our midst!

And who could forget the chili cookoff?! Dave Rush played the part of judge, and boy did he have a tough job! All four chilis that entered the contest were of equal caliber, with different merits to each of them. I sampled all four. However, one chili stood out in the group. This chili had a strange (dare I say *diarrhea*) green color to it, with a savory and perfectly spiced flavor profile. This chili won the cookoff, and congratulations are in order to our office manager, Michael, and his partner, John. The chili was named "Mike and


#### Star Wars: The Rise of Skywalker Saturday, January 4th, afternoon (showtime tbd)




#### FAITH ADULT CHRISTIAN EDUCATION for JANUARY 2020

- 1. The meeting began with a devotional and opening prayer lead by Pastor Ben.
- 2. The covenant was read by all attendees.

  - i) Music director holding some skype interviews.
  - j) Purchase of a defibrillator.
  - k) Back parking lot sign was rotted out and is being rejuvenated by Bob Bay.
- 7. Mission Statement- 43 possible mission statements were submitted by all members of council. Each one was reviewed and discussed.
