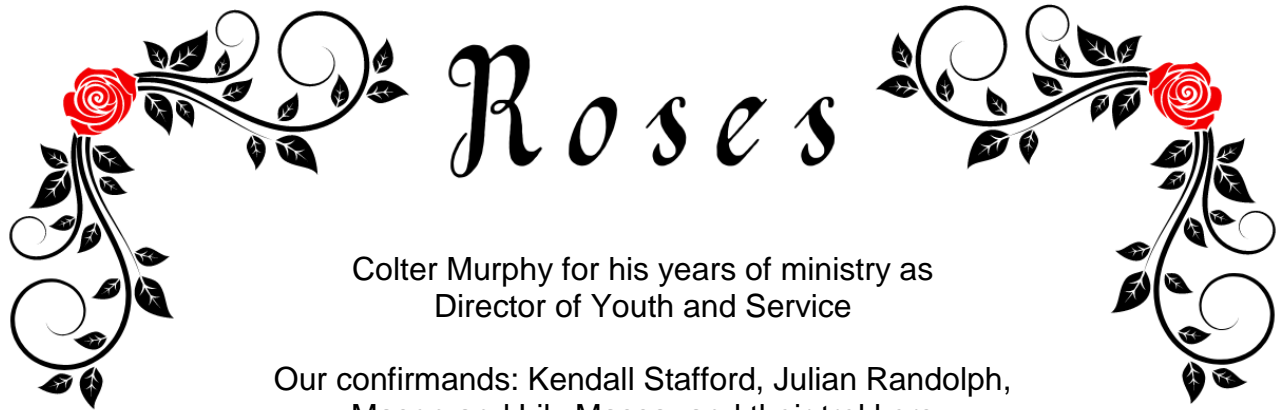

Pastor's Article

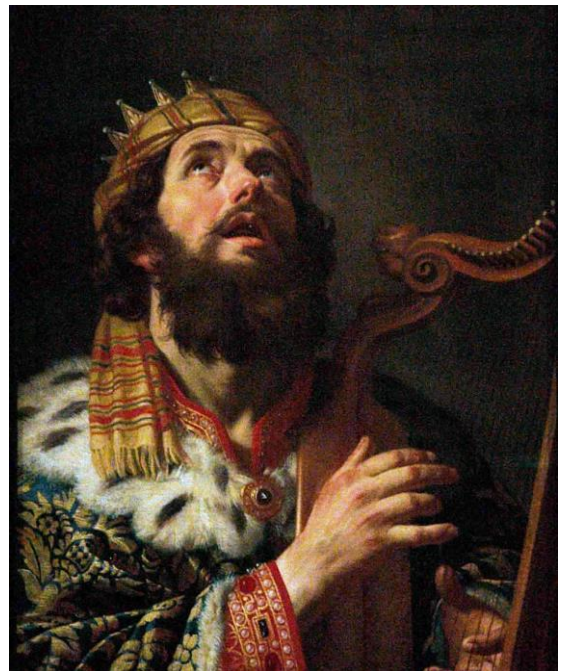
The Story of David

Each Sunday we read scriptures set by what is called a "lectionary." From December through May our lectionary has us read gospel lessons that tell the story of Jesus' birth, life, death, resurrection, and ascension. The lectionary also pairs each of these gospel readings with texts from the Old Testament and the Epistles so that we can see how all of scripture points to Jesus. But in the summer and fall, the lectionary shifts its focus away from Jesus' life and towards Jesus' teachings.

In the summer we are also given the opportunity to read one continuous story from the Old Testament, instead of jumping from Old Testament passage to Old Testament passage in an attempt to match the gospel. Last summer our Old Testament readings told the story of how God's promise came to be fulfilled that Abraham and Sarah would have descendants more numerous than the stars and that they would live in the Holy Land. To that end we heard of Abraham and Sarah's struggles with infertility, how those struggles shaped their relationships to each other, their family, and God. We heard about Abraham and Sarah's grandchild Jacob came to be called Israel, and how Israel's son Joseph came to rule in Egypt. We learned how the Egyptians grew fearful of the Israelites, and enslaved them, and how God raises up Moses, Aaron, and Miriam to lead God's people to freedom. And how at last, generations later, Abraham and Sarah's numerous descendants claimed the land that had been promised, and God's word was fulfilled.

This summer we will focus on another of the Old Testament's grand and sweeping stories. This summer we will study the story of Israel's most famous king, David. We will hear of his rise, his reign, his failures, and his legacy carried on through his son Solomon. June will focus on David's rise to power, and we will juxtapose David's leadership with that of Jesus. July will focus on how David envisions his own kingdom, versus how Jesus describes the Kingdom of God. August will focus on David's sin and the passing of the throne to his son Solomon who more fully understands that to be a great ruler is to seek God's wisdom.

As we read about David and Solomon and the cast of characters that surrounds them, it is important to remember that these are real people, and like all people they are simultaneously sinners and saints.



David is perhaps one of the best examples of this in all of scripture. In this shepherd-turned-king we will see shining examples of how to be God's faithful servant, and we will also see the depths of human corruption. One does not negate the other.

David is a particularly rich biblical character to study because we have not just the biblical historian's account of his life, we have the music that David wrote reflecting on his life in the form of the psalms. Each Sunday, after we read a chapter of David's life, we will hear sung David's own music praising, lamenting, or confessing those very deeds.

We won't get to read every part of David's story on Sunday morning, so if you'd like to fill in the gaps, I encourage you to read the following passages during the week in June:

June 6th at church: 1 Samuel 8:4-20, 11:14-15

June 7th - 12th at home: 1 Samuel 12:1 - 15:34

June 13th at church: 1 Samuel 15:34--16:13

June 14th - 19th at home: 1 Samuel 16:14 - 20:42

June 20th at church: 1 Samuel 17:1a, 4-11, 19-23, 32-49

June 21st - 26th at home: 1 Samuel 21:1 - 30:13

June 27th at church: 2 Samuel 1:1, 17-27

June 28th - July 3rd at home: 2 Samuel 1:1 - 2 Samuel 4:12

July 4th at church: 2 Samuel 5:1-5, 9-10

Next month, I'll include the suggested weekly readings for July.

King David's story is epic on every scale. And it has much to teach us, not only about God and governance, but family, friendship, and the longings of the human heart. I look forward to spending the summer reading the richness of scripture with you.

Worship and Covid Policy

The Center for Disease Control released new guidelines for vaccinated people that greatly reduced the number of places in which vaccinated people are instructed to wear masks. The State of California also released a statement stating that California's mask mandate will continue in effect until June 15.



With this scientific and legal information, Faith's council met last night to discuss what the implications are for our spiritual community. We entered our conversation mindful that the past 14 months have been incredibly stressful and challenging for our whole community. There are those among us for whom masks have been physically uncomfortable and socially stifling, and they cannot wait to remove them. There are also those among us for whom wearing masks has given them some semblance of control over the safety of their loved ones in a year of turmoil, and they are not yet ready to remove their masks. While most of our congregation has been vaccinated, children under 12 still cannot receive the vaccine, forcing parents to be particularly cautious as masks come down. And there are some adults who cannot or will not take the vaccine.

With all these considerations in mind, Faith has adopted the following new Covid-19 policies:

Following California state law, we will continue to require masks for worship until June 15th, at which point, they will become optional. Continuing the mask mandate until June 15 gives those of us who are anxious about removing masks time to come to terms with the transition. It also gives hope to those of us who are anxious to be rid of masks that the end is in sight. Waiting to remove masks gives us another month to improve community immunity. Importantly, this timeline abides by the law. If you have not been vaccinated, please continue to wear your mask for the safety of children who cannot yet be vaccinated.

Effective immediately, we will stop taking RSVPs, stop assigned seating, and stop temperature checks. Seating will now be first come, first served. Based on the CDC guidelines, ceasing assigned seating and temperature checks will have minimal impact on the safety of worshippers, and it will be a tangible step towards making worship feel less restrictive and more welcoming. Each week we consistently have an abundance of available seats, even limiting our capacity to 50%. Additional seats will be added over the next several weeks as restrictions relax.

Small groups (15 or less) meeting on Faith's campus may meet without masks when vaccinated and with the consent of the people gathered. Both CDC guidelines and the State of California permit a group of fully vaccinated people to gather indoors without masks. If you are meeting with a small group at Faith, please ask those you are with if they are vaccinated and comfortable removing masks.

This past year has been one of constant change and learning new ways to care for ourselves and for our neighbors. I am grateful for the love, generosity, and courtesy that our congregation has shown each other throughout these challenges.

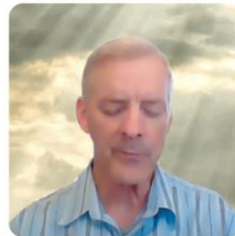

The Trip Report

Farewell

It's hard to believe I'm sitting down to write my final trip report. I first began writing these monthly trip briefs as a way to communicate with all of you about what the youth and I were up to. I enjoyed writing about all the trips almost as much as I enjoyed leading them. By the time you read this I will already be in Montana, beginning in my new role as Children, Youth and Family Director at St Paul Lutheran in Missoula. As a parting note, I thought it would be fun to recap some of the adventures we've had over the past three years.

We've made three trips to the Lassen National Forest in the wintertime to go snowshoeing. These were awesome intergenerational events! Snowshoeing is both beginner-friendly and a challenging workout for everyone, and the conversation that naturally occurred as folks were breathing hard were second to none. I loved eating lunch with everyone on the snowbank after we've all worked up a healthy appetite.

In the springtime, we took two trips to the Jesus Center Farm. The first was a collaboration with a campus ministry group in Montana who were passing through after some time in San Francisco. Quin Troester led our group then, and our youth bonded with the college students. The second time was on the property of Mike and Elise, two FLC members who lease their property to the Jesus Center to farm. This was another special trip, as the youth picked pea sprouts and radishes and learned about local food webs.



A few special hikes stand out for me. One was at Bald Rock, where the youth and I witnessed a marriage proposal from far away while exploring the great slabs of granite. Another was a stroll out at the Pine Creek section of the Sacramento Wildlife Refuge, which took place right at the start of the pandemic. It was a rainy day, but it felt good to be hanging out outside despite the lingering fear caused by pandemic anxiety. The most recent hike we went on was at Table Mountain. Despite the vast crowds the day was full of beautiful flowers and camaraderie.

There have been several fun, intergenerational events tied to particular seasons. For one, the Advent Workshop led by Susan Reed. What an awesome event. I remember Michael and John proudly winning the chili cookoff, and I remember the sounds of our house Christmas band playing all of the caroling classics. Another favorite is the Ash Wednesday Carnival, complete with a bounce house and a pancake dinner. It's always

so fun to do goofy things together. I can still picture Alex Van Dusen's messy face after he searched a whipped cream pie to find sour candy.

Months of preparation went into planning Camp Noah, a special camp in 2019 for children who survived the Camp Fire. This was an incredible week full of smiles, healing, and joy. To see all of the volunteers come together despite their doubts was truly inspiring. The colorful image of a giant parachute being played with in our sanctuary will always stand out to me, as well as the fun water relay race we did on the final day.

Several big trips are worth mentioning. One, Rancho Santa Marta, was an incredible experience with a diverse group of happy helpers. Through the work we shared together and the memories we made over street tacos and games of catch, we grew closer as a group and in our faith. The hospitality of Rancho Santa Marta was overwhelming and special to receive.



Another big trip was the middle school retreat put on by the Sierra Pacific Synod Youth Committee (SPSYC), which was held at Mt. Cross. It was awesome to lead this trip with Dianna Snyder and get to know Mason, Lily, and Kendall throughout the weekend. On our last day we went to the beach in Santa Cruz and ate some delicious ice cream. It was a great time.

All of these trips have brought our church closer together, and helped us grow as a community of faith. It's

startling to see just how much our youth have grown, through service to their community and time spent together. I am immensely proud of all of our high school, middle school, elementary, and pre-school youth. I know they will continue to grow and to change the world with their tenacity and creativity. I have been blessed to know all of them.

I have also been blessed to have known so many joyful adults who have been eager to spend time with these young people. Without the support of them, these trips would have been impossible. Each adult brings their own style to leadership and has their own unique way of relating to young folks, and I have had the joy of learning from each adult. A heartfelt thanks to them! And to any adult who has supported the First Third of Life Ministry in any way, I give my sincere thanks.

I know that the future holds many fun trips and events for the young people of Faith Lutheran, and I can't wait to read about them when I start receiving my copy of Faith Talks in Montana. Blessings to all of you, and thank you for a terrific three years of ministry together.

Council Minutes

May 17, 2021 in Joel Zimbelman's Back Yard

1. Devotion – Joel Zimbelman
2. Opening Prayer – Pr. Ben Colahan
3. Covenant – read by all
4. Approval of minutes from last meeting- Mark made the motion to approve as presented, Meridith seconded. Motion passed.
5. Financial Report-Mark Kimmelshue – doing well to date especially considering the current financials include three staff members' salaries. Susan made motion to approve, Sherrill seconded the motion. Motion passed.
6. Announcements and upcoming dates of note:
 - a. Annual meeting this Sunday immediately after service
 - b. Council terms change over on July 1st
 - c. Vacation bible school happens June 7th thru the 11th at St Johns
 - d. Holden Village is open again, most likely will happen for the summer of 2022
7. Review of proposed agenda for the annual meeting. The annual meeting will also be available on Zoom. The new audio-visual system will allow members attending virtually to take the floor utilizing the speakers and the video screens in the sanctuary. This will allow for everyone to be able to ask questions or share their thoughts.

The full budget for 2021-2022 has been posted on line to the FLC website.

8. Update on Family Life Director search – Pr. Ben. Cindy and Pastor Ben have completed five Zoom Interviews, all were well qualified but none were the perfect fit. Over the past week the team has made contact with additional candidates while another option might be to call a deacon. A deacon is someone who has gone through seminary and is trained for word and service ministry. Base compensation is \$58,000 which is \$4,000 over budget. If no other applicants pan out, Pastor Ben wanted permission to begin the process to look to calling a deacon. This could take a while to finalize the call.

Mark made the motion that if a suitable candidate isn't located within the next two weeks, to allow Pastor Ben to begin the search for a deacon. Sherrill seconded. Motion approved. Joel also encouraged everyone to reach out to see if we can come up with additional candidates.

9. Capital needs for 2021-2022 – Goal is to fund raise an additional \$150,000 for the next 12 months, but no money will be spent until the funds have been received. The list of next goals can be found on the FLC website.

Mark made the motion to make the next priority the upgrading the nursery, rooms 6 & 7 and create an exterior bathroom. Doug seconded the motion. Motion passed.

10. CDC update and FLC mask policy – CDC stated late last week that they were removing the mask mandate for anyone who has been vaccinated; however yesterday Governor Newsom stated that masks are still required in California until June 15th. The following guidelines were discussed and adopted for FLC.
 - a. No longer assigned seating.
 - b. Stop RSVP requirements as we are still considerably under the maximum capacity.
 - c. No temperature checks.
 - d. Effective through June 15th masks, will be continue to be required for Sunday service. Thereafter masks will be optional based on CDC and the State of CA guidelines.
 - e. Small groups (15 or less) when vaccinated may meet without masks when comfortable.
 - f. Rows of chairs will be spaced 6 feet apart with groups of 8 chairs. Additional seats will be added over the next several weeks as restrictions relax.
 - g. Begin Inviting outside groups to utilize the space.

Mark made the motion to approve the above protocol, Doug seconded. Motion carried.

Welcome to the first Benevolence Report, brought to you by Financial Secretary Lynette Stensrud, Manager Mike, and our illustrious bookkeeper Jeanette Joslyn. In an effort to be more engaging and hands-on with our finances and benevolence, we will provide a small blurb after each Financial Report about designated giving. This month, we're happy to report that our Rise Against Hunger trivia event raised \$430. That plus \$128.69 from the Social Ministry fund went to support Rise Against Hunger directly for a total of \$558.69. To recap from recent-past events, \$212 raised from Lent was given to Safe Space; \$871.31 was raised from our Rancho Santa Marta fundraiser, and combined with \$128.69 Social Ministry miscellaneous fund, we were able to give an even \$1000 to Bethesda Teaching Ministries who oversee ministry in Rancho Santa Marta; and \$1000 was distributed from our Disaster Relief: COVID fund.

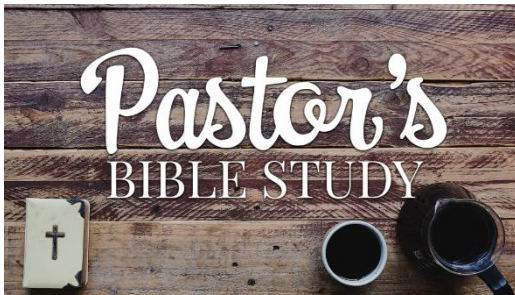


Centering Prayer

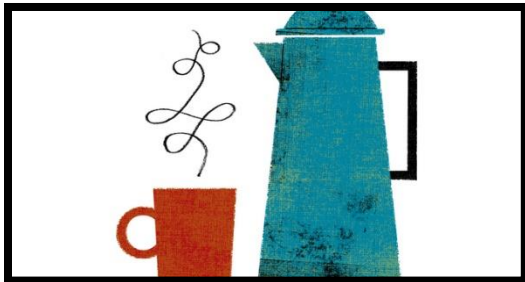


Pastor's Bible Study

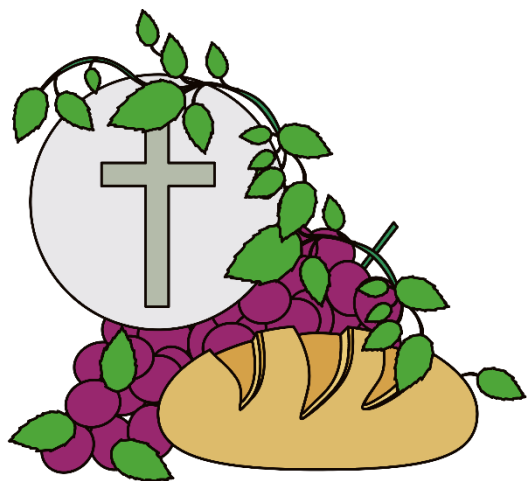
