

PASTOR'S ARTICLE: ALL SAINTS DAY

The first Sunday in November, we celebrate All Saints' Day! So what is a saint? In Roman Catholicism, official saints are people whom the church has investigated and found to have lived holy lives, believed orthodox doctrine, and who, after death, have performed miracles in response to prayer.

But as Lutherans, we have a broader understanding of sainthood. Saints are the people whom Jesus has claimed as God's beloved children. Like our Roman Catholic siblings, we understand saints to be people who are holy, but we believe that holiness comes not from our action, but Christ's. The apostle Paul writes, "since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Romans 3:23-4). To put it more simply, if being a saint means being holy and working miracles, no one is perfect enough to be a saint on their own, but Jesus gives us his holiness and works miracles through each of us daily. Jesus makes us who are sinners to also be saints at the same time.

On All Saints Day, we celebrate not only the big biblical heroes that we learn about in Sunday school, we also celebrate the saints in our lives who have shown us what it means to be a beloved child of God, imperfect and yet vehicles for God's miraculous love. In 2 Timothy, a mother and a grandmother get lifted up as saints through whom the faith was passed down to Timothy (2. Tim. 1:5). On All Saints' Day, many of us will remember our ancestors who shared with us their faith and have since died. But saints can be living in our midst.

Last month my daughter Sophia was born. She has already done an incredible job of teaching me what it means to be a beloved child of God. I am continually struck by how frustrating it is to care for her, changing diapers 10 – 12 times a day, waking up several time a night to feed her; and yet I am also struck by how much I love her.

The only thing more miraculous than my daughter is my love for her at 3 in the morning. I can only imagine God feels the same way about me, looking at the messes I make each day, my inability to survive without Christ's constant care, and yet God only loves me more and more

each day. On All Saint's Day, saint Sophia will be one of the names I lift up. And so will all of your names.

These past few weeks, my wife Annalisa and I have been overwhelmed by your love and care. The meals that you have brought us daily, the gifts which with you have showered us, the offers of help that you have made: on the days in which figuring out how to be a new parent feels overwhelming, your acts of love feel like miracles that give us strength. But perhaps the greatest miracle that you have given us is paternity leave. The six weeks that you have given me to be with my wife and daughter have been profound and life changing. I have put aside all my other responsibilities and indemnities and been simply and fully a father and a husband. This time also allowed me to build a strong foundation for my future relationship with Sophia, to be confident in my fatherhood, and to know and love Annalisa in a whole new way. I also truly believe that my paternity leave has made me a better pastor; I have deeper understanding of life and love.

This paternity leave was only possible with your support, both financial and logistical. Thank you for all that you do to ensure that, with or without me present, Faith Lutheran Church is a community reflecting God's love with a place at the table for everyone. I am excited to return to leading worship regularly on November 7th for All Saints Day. On that day, I encourage you to bring photographs and reminders of the saints in your life. I will also bring pictures of my saints who cannot be here that day, but when I look out at the congregation, your faces will be my greatest reminder that I am surrounded by saints who work Christ's miraculous love in my life each and every day.

SPIRITUAL GIFTS PART III: DISCERNMENT

As part of our exploration of the spiritual gifts that God instills in each of us, this month we focus on the gift of discernment. Discernment is described by the ELCA as "the gift that motivates a believer to seek God's will and purpose and apply that understanding to individual and congregational situations." Elements of our church council, youth & young adult groups, and social ministry endeavors involve a degree of discernment.

"Discernment and judgement are closely related," says council president Cindy Kampf. "Discernment involves asking yourself, 'Are the words I am speaking and the actions I am taking, making the situation or relationship better or worse?' Judgement involves asking yourself, 'Am I right or is the other person wrong?' We seek to convince the other person of the correctness of our position. Discernment begins by prefacing our conversations with 'Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in your sight, O Lord, my strength, and my redeemer."

But discernment, good judgment, and conflict resolution aren't practices limited to leadership roles within the congregation or even grown-ups, for that matter. "I often ask young people who are in the middle of conflict, 'Do you want to be right, or do you want to be happy?"" continues Cindy. "That does not mean that we fold and give in to pressure. It means that we seek to understand the other person's point of view and value them as a fellow traveler in life's journey. We learn when we listen. We reinforce our own position when we talk."

Another thing reinforced in young people is to plan, plan, plan. Just ask our Director of Family Life, Dani Vogel: "One of the biggest phrases that I heard in high school, and in college, was 'What's your 5 year plan?' Somehow, at 15, I was supposed to know exactly what I wanted to

have accomplished by the time I turned 20. One of the pastors that served my church I grew up in, would often use the phrase, 'You want to make God laugh? Make plans.' I lived in the intersection of these two thoughts when it came to figuring out who, and what I wanted to be when I eventually grew up. The outside noise and influence of what I was doing with my life grew stronger as our society changed. Jobs and opportunities are presented to our youth and young adults today that weren't even a thought when I was 15. When these big life discussions come up with our young people in our communities, I try not to be one of those loud noisy voices trying to steer them down a path I think they should travel. I want to make sure that we encourage our youth and young adults to choose their own adventure."

Young or old, we all seek our own adventures, and by the grace of God we can discern from them wisdom and truth to aid our actions.

But, as it is written, "What no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor the human heart conceived, what God has prepared for those who love him"— these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God. For what human being knows what is truly human except the human spirit that is within? So also no one comprehends what is truly God's except the Spirit of God. Now we have received not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit that is from God, so that we may understand the gifts bestowed on us by God. And we speak of these things in words not taught by human wisdom but taught by the Spirit, interpreting spiritual things to those who are spiritual. Those who are unspiritual do not receive the gifts of God's Spirit, for they are foolishness to them, and they are unable to understand them because they are spiritually discerned. Those who are spiritual discern all things, and they are themselves subject to no one else's scrutiny. "For who has known the mind of the Lord so as to instruct him?" But we have the mind of Christ. -1 Corinthians 2:9-16, NRSV

Where might your gifts call you? Are you called to lead, or to minister in support? To teach or to learn? To work hands-on or to contemplate and organize? This month, take some time to talk with other members of the congregation about their experience in Faith ministry. Ask your neighbor where they have been called to serve, and what wisdom they have discerned from ministering in Christ's name.

THE PARKING LOT FOOD BANK: SERVING OUR NEIGHBORS IN NEED



Everyday hundreds of people in our local community struggle to meet their basic nutritional needs. Children, adults, and seniors are suffering from hunger. The Contra Costa Solano County Food Bank, part of the Feeding America network, the country's largest domestic hunger-relief organization, operating out of the parking lot at Faith Lutheran Church (FLC) is working to connect people with food and end hunger.

Lisa Roehling, manager of the food bank program for the Northern California region, stated that the food assistance program expanded from the Bay Area into Butte, Glenn, Colusa, and Tehama Counties in 2017 as part of Feeding America's goal to end hunger. In 2018, the focus on assistance in Butte County shifted to providing food to survivors of the Camp Fire.

From 2018 to the end of 2020, the food bank operated out of the parking lot at the Butte College-Chico Campus parking lot. Lisa said that when the contract to operate out of the college parking lot ended, they were having difficulty finding another site in Chico until a volunteer with FLC, picking up groceries for homebound members of the church, suggested they contact the church to see if the parking lot was available; it was, and the food bank began operations out of the FLC parking lot in January 2021.

The current mission of the food bank is to aid disaster victims and others in need of food. Lisa said that there are 56 partner agencies who provide the food that the food bank distributes in Chico. Raley's Food for Families program is one of the agencies funding the food bank. Money donated at the Raley's in Chico goes directly to purchase groceries that are distributed out of the FLC parking lot. Lisa added, "When you give to Raley's Food for Families program, 100 percent of your donation goes to feeding Butte County residents in need. Every donation, even if just a dollar, is a huge help."



The food bank operates out of the FLC parking lot on the first and third Friday of each month. Operating hours are from 10:00 am to 12:00 pm. The food bank offers drive-thru style distribution, and each household is provided a box of nonperishable food and a bag of produce. Approximately 350 households are being assisted each month.

Lisa stated, "No one should have to choose between making ends meet or a meal. Your support matters to our neighbors in need, who face impossible choices every day. The use of the FLC parking lot has been a life-saver!"

If you are interested in volunteering with the food bank, either on an on-going basis or just once or twice a year, duties include but are not limited to helping unload the pallets of food from the truck, sorting and bagging the groceries, and loading the food and produce into vehicles as they drive-thru. Volunteer hours are from 8:30 am to 12:00 pm. For more information, please contact Doug De Soto at 530-354-1453.



The Social Ministry Team Presents FLC Service Opportunities

The Blue Bags project collects non-perishable food items that go to local area food banks where they are distributed to needy families. In line with scripture, "For I was hungry, and you gave me food," individuals can donate food items to the Blue Bags project which are collected every two-months. FLC members can leave their donations in the church office or request the donations be picked up by Blue Bags volunteers.



Comanche Creek Clean-Up event occurs every Sunday from 1:20 to 2:40 pm. This is an opportunity to meet and get to know the campers living at Comanche Creek while helping them with trash pick-up. Volunteers connect with the North State Shelter Team (NSST) truck & service trailer at the Comanche Creek parking lot off of Park Avenue (volunteer parking is available in the Salvation Army parking lot across from the park entrance). NSST

provides trash bags and long stick pickers. Join us. Pick up some trash. Help address a crisis. Feel good. No long-term commitment required; volunteer as your schedule allows!

Food Bank Volunteer: No one should have to choose between making ends meet or a meal. If you are interested in volunteering with the food bank operating out of the FLC parking lot **the first and third Friday of every month,** either on an on-going basis or just as a one-time event, duties include but are not limited to helping unload the pallets of food from the truck, sorting and bagging the groceries, and loading the food and produce into vehicles as they drive-thru. Volunteer hours are from 8:30 am to 12:00 pm.

Hunger Trolley Helper's Group mission is to provide lifesaving meals and essential supplies to anyone in need. The Hunger Trolley operates out of the FLC kitchen every Friday from 4:00 pm to 6:00 pm preparing, packaging, and delivering food to homeless encampments in the Chico area. If you are interested in volunteering duties include assisting with cooking and preparing snack bags as needed, assisting with packing hot meals to-go, driving to the delivery location, distributing meals, and cleaning-up the church kitchen. Volunteers welcome on a one-time basis or as often as your situation allows!

The Mercy House is a collaboration between the Chico Housing Action Team (CHAT) and FLC to provide housing and support to medically fragile, homeless women. Mercy House volunteers from FLC provide friendship and oversee weekly "House" meetings with the residents of the Mercy House to support them in their journey to stability and security. The volunteer team meets weekly for one hour with the residents at the Mercy House. Volunteers are asked to commit to a minimum of 6 months of service. Volunteers are screened through the CHAT office.



Random Acts of Kindness Day occurs annually on February 17th. The holiday was started by the Random Acts of Kindness Foundation, which was founded in 1995. On this day the Social Ministry Team encourages you to spend the day doing random acts of kindness. Acts of kindness you might consider doing: Compliment at least 5 people; Let the person in line behind you go ahead of you; Leave happy notes around town; Babysit for a single mom for free; Help an elderly neighbor take out the trash or mow their lawn.

Red Cross Month occurs annually every March. During Red Cross Month, the Social Ministry Team encourages everyone to celebrate the volunteer heroes who help families overcome life's emergencies every day. During this month we ask you to consider: **Giving blood:** Make an appointment to donate lifesaving blood or platelets. **Making a financial donation:** donate at redcross.org/giving day. **Volunteer:** Visit the volunteer information site on redcross.org.

Torres Shelter Dinner is a program where teams of volunteers from FLC use the church budget to purchase ingredients for, prepare, and serve the dinner meal at the Torres Shelter the first Tuesday of each month. The time frame for prepping and serving **each meal usually lasts from 4:00 pm to 7:00 pm. Each team typically serves two to three meals over the course of the year.** As one team leader stated, "Volunteering at the Torres Shelter is not as intimidating as people might think; it is fun and rewarding."



"Dear friends, this year marks the 9th year of [my husband] Steve's passing. Hosting a blood drive is such a meaningful way to remember Steve as he had a vitality about him to the very end that was only possible because of the many transfusions he received. Covid-19 once again

precludes a blood drive at Faith Lutheran Church this year. Instead we have set up a Virtual Blood Drive for **November 1 – 14.** Donors do not need to live in our area to donate, so please help get the word out both near and far! With the recent COIVD spike, donations have been way down and all blood types are in urgent demand. We would like to encourage you to donate blood if you are feeling well and healthy. Stonewall Alliance Center and **Faith Lutheran Church** will be teaming up again to provide a safe space to hold **Transgender Day of Remembrance**, a vigil honoring the lives lost due to acts of anti-transgender violence.

Flag Planting: Sunday, November 14th after service at 11am Each year we plant white flags in the front lawn to honor lives lost. All FLC and Chico Community members are welcome to help us plant flags.



Community Altar: Monday the 15th - Friday the 19th

A community altar will be available in Room 5 from 10am-4:30pm throughout the week where you can come and bring offerings, decorate (supplies will be available) and pray or meditate.

Vigil: Saturday, November 20th at 6pm

Join us for the candlelight vigil in the courtyard on Saturday evening as we read the names of those lost. All are welcome to attend in support. If you are able to bake and bring comfort snacks like cookies, please call Michael at (530) 895-3754. Snacks will be distributed after the vigil in safe to-go boxes to comfort those in mourning.



Sunday, November 14th After Service


