June will bring three opportunities for spiritual connection: one liturgical, one global, and one personal. The liturgical spiritual connection is the return of Healing Prayer Ministers in Sunday

worship. James 5:14 says, "Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord." Healing Prayer Ministers are spiritual elders in our congregation who are available during communion for private prayer and anointing as described in James. These individuals sit to the side of the sanctuary during communion wearing robes. If you are carrying any sickness, be it physical, emotional, or spiritual, you are invited to sit with the Healing Prayer Minister. You can name something in particular for which you would like prayer, or you can simply ask for a general blessing; God knows what you need. The Healing Prayer Minister will hold your hands, pray over you, and then mark you with the sign of the cross using olive oil that has been blessed. It is a simple but profound experience given to us by scripture that brings healing to body and soul. I encourage you to make use of it. And if you feel called to be a Healing Prayer Minister, please contact the office so that we can train you.



The global spiritual connection is the news that we are planning a congregational trip to the Holy Land in January of 2023! A trip to the Holy Land is something that council members and I have been considering from some time. We finally got the push that we needed when two fellow Lutheran pastors and friends of mine with experience in the Holy Land planned a trip and invited Faith Lutheran to join them. Pastor Khader Khalilia currently serves a Lutheran church in Brooklyn but grew up in Palestine. Pastor Amy Kienzle serves St. John's Lutheran in Sacramento and previously studied in Palestine. Together they will

bring rich local and Biblical perspectives to the journey that we will undertake together. We will be using a tour company that specializes in church trips called Good Shepherd Travel which will provide a modern air-conditioned private bus, an English-speaking local guide, and handle all the logistics from the flight to the hotels. The dates January 16-26th, with the option to add an additional trip to Jordan through the 29th. The cost is \$3,590, and that includes airfare, hotels, food, and fees to the all the sites. The deadline to register is July 16th. To sign up you can visit store.tourtheholylands.com/collections/holy-land-tours and look for the tour with my picture, watch for the church emails with a direct link, or stop by the office for a brochure.

Finally, the personal spiritual connection in June is the baptism of my daughter Sophia. During worship on June 26th, we will wash Sophia in the waters of promise, unite her with Christ, and proclaim her to be God's beloved child. As Lutherans, we believe that baptism is a communal act. God does all the work of claiming us once and forever in baptism, but we as a congregation do the daily work of reminding each other each and every day that God has claimed us, that Christ loves us, and the Holy Spirit works through us. These truths are given to us in baptism, but the world wants us to forget, and so we gather together throughout our lives to



remind each other what has always been true. People of Faith, you have been such an incredible blessing to me: introducing me to my wife, celebrating our marriage, supporting us in the birth of our child. On June 26th, I will ask something more from you: help me raise my daughter in God's grace, help her remember that she belongs to Jesus, help her know the power of the Spirit within her. For there will be a day Sophia will not listen to me. I will be her annoying dad who knows nothing. On that day, may you be the voice of God, present at her baptism, which says, "You are my beloved child with whom I am well pleased." Amen.

SPIRITUAL GIFTS PART X: KNOWLEDGE

Knowledge: described by the ELCA as the gift that drives a person to learn, analyze and uncover new insights with regard to the Bible and faith. There are five fabulous ministries at Faith

that use the gift of knowledge. The first is **Directory Editor**, an administrative ministry that embodies "knowledge" in a more literal, less biblical sense.

Editors help with proofreading and all the technical stuff that comes with building a directory, but building a directory is also a good time to look through a list of Faith family members and say, "You know, I haven't heard from them in a while. I'm going to give them a call and check in!"

Faith Adult Cristian Education, or FACE Class teachers, connect stories and lessons from the Bible to our personal lives. One of the most unnoticed roles of Social Ministry is that of advocacy. Advocacy is seeking to influence public policy. Advocacy is defined in the dictionary as "to speak or plead on behalf of another." From its

earliest conception the Lutheran Christian movement has been known for sharing the good news of the Bible with all people in order to create a more just society.



For many of us, advocacy is how we show love for one another – activity done for the well-being of others – especially the most vulnerable among us: people experiencing homelessness or hunger, the neglected, and those experiencing physical or mental illness. The ELCA defines advocacy as "seeking to express God's special concern for people living in poverty, and the vulnerable by helping to shape the laws and policies that define how we live together in God's world. It is particularly with and for those who voice is not heard in the places of power. Advocacy is an extension of the church's practice of loving our neighbors, a practice that reaches back to Israel's

calling, Jesus' ministry, and the witness of the early church. Advocacy goes beyond the important gifts of charity, like clothing, food, time, and money."

As members of Faith Lutheran Church we are blessed to have many opportunities to share both collectively and individually our spiritual gifts to serve and love our neighbors. God uses our hands to put into place the care needed for people experiencing hunger, illness, and poverty. As members of the ELCA we also have the opportunity to live out the Lutheran belief that governments can help advance the common good and we can become "people of justice and mercy in the public square."

The ELCA in its Social Statement on advancing the common good explains that "ELCA advocacy works for changes in public policy based on the experiences of Lutheran ministries, programs and projects around the world, and in communities across the United States. We work through political channels on behalf of the following biblical values: peacekeeping, hospitality to strangers, care for creation, and concern for people struggling with poverty and disease."

Advocacy work is one of the many ways that we extend the love, mercy, and inclusion of Christ's table into the world around us. Over the past two years, the Social Ministry Team has advocated at the local level for humane treatment of the homelessness, at the state level for clean water legislation and development of low-income housing, and on the federal level for policy changes and legislation to support Afghan and Ukraine refugees, as well as asylum seekers and undocumented adults from our Southern border.



Want to get involved? Join us and stand up for policies that create opportunities to overcome poverty, promote peace and dignity, and defend God's creation. At the local level, become familiar with the policies our City Council and Board of Supervisors are implementing. Visit chico.ca.us/city-council and buttecounty.net/boardofsupervisors for agendas and minutes, and to participate in monthly meetings. At the state level visit the California Lutheran Office of Public Policy at lutheranpublicpolicyca.org to see legislation pending in the state legislature, and on the federal and global level visit the ELCA Advocacy Network at elca.org/advocacy to reach out to officials on relevant and timely issues.

Beyond Data: a Look at Our Area's Shelter Crisis Doug De Soto, Social Ministry Chair

As the City of Chico begins to emerge from our current shelter crisis, arguably one of the most severe disasters to hit the streets

and parks of Chico in a generation, it is notable that the North State Shelter Team (NSST) has identified 38 homeless peoples camp sites in the Chico metro area.

We estimate that there are at least 450 homeless people in those 38 camps. There is good news on the horizon though. Short term, with the opening of the Pallet Shelter at the old BMX site on April 25, 2022, 177 shelters with two beds in each shelter have been added to the inventory of shelter beds. Because "double-bunking" cannot be mandated, we anticipate an additional 177 to 250 beds being available to the homeless.

In other good news, the Jesus Center recently broke ground on its Renewal Center which is expected to open in June 2023 and will bring in an additional 100 shelter beds including 14 units designed for families up to 5 people. While experts say the solution to homelessness ultimately lies in increasing the stock of subsidized and low-income-housing for individuals and families along with wrap around services, there is currently a lack of such housing in our area.

On a positive note, former colleagues at the Housing Authority of the County of Butte and the City of Chico have told me that there is a myriad of low-income and voucher- based housing projects in the works that should come on-line in the next three to five years. That being said, the Pallet Shelter, the Renewal Center and on-going Torres Shelter plans, while increasing the inventory of shelter beds in our area, are not nearly enough to house those in need. As we wait for additional shelter beds and the opening of new low-income and subsidized housing projects, we need to consider additional options to fill the gap. The NSST is in the process of finalizing plans for three campgrounds on five acres of private property that would be an off

the grid – safe, secure, and sanitary – shelter for about 100 people, that could be operational before this winter. The Social Ministry Team will be exploring ways we can collaborate with the NSST to support and advocate for a managed campground and develop volunteer service opportunities for Faith Lutheran Church members.

This is an exciting time to be an advocate for the homeless. As new beds are added to the shelter bed inventory over the next few years along with wrap around services such as case management to provide assistance with permanent housing, employment, health care and treatment for substance abuse, Faith Lutheran Church will be called upon to envision new ways that we can transform our current street outreach ministries to include how we can best serve those entering into new shelter environments. Watch this space!

It was a joy to be a witness to such a meaningful confirmation celebration. I was inspired by our familiar rituals and music. The choir and organist were almost as good as ours at Faith Lutheran. We are part of a worldwide Christian family.

As we move into the next council year, let us constantly think of ways to celebrate our uniqueness as a congregation and inspire each other to always reach out to our fellow brothers and sisters in Christ.


