# Pastor's Article: Witness to Resurrection Pastor Ben Colahan

We are witnesses to the resurrection. We weren't in Jerusalem 2000 years ago, but we have seen a whole society enter a tomb, and, on the beginning of the third year, angels have rolled away its stone. Our whole world did the unthinkable, it

completely altered how humans live. Billions of people underwent a form of social death, so that millions of people might have life. This is the story of the cross writ large. It is the story of loving sacrifice. The story of laying down our lives, that they might be raised up in love. It is the story of losing what we knew and discovering what God has prepared.

What rises out of the tomb is not what was buried in it. We have yet to truly understand the ways in which our society will be forever reshaped by this pandemic, but already I am amazed by the ways the Holy Spirit has transformed our congregation.

Many of the changes we made during the pandemic at Faith Lutheran were temporary, and have already ceased, hopefully for good. We are once again holding worship in-person, without masks required, and with singing. We once again share coffee and cake after worship and pass the peace in ways that physically connect us. The months without these blessings were truly painful, but they were temporary. The blessings that were born from them are permanent.

We now have a state-of-the-art livestreaming system that allows us to broadcast our worship services live to anywhere in the world. Members who are sick, seniors who struggle to leave their home, friends and family who are traveling abroad are now able to be a part of our worship services wherever they might be. This tool to share the good news of Jesus was born of a temporary pain,

but it is with us to stay.

During the months of being unable to sing together, our Director of Worship and Music, Luke Nicolay dusted off our bell set and reformed the bell choir. We give thanks that the singing choir is once again rehearsing together in order to lead worship during Holy Week, but the bell choir will keep ringing also. This return to our bell-ringing heritage arose out of the loss of song, but though the singing has returned, the ringing will stay.





In the midst of learning new ways to care for the health of our congregation, we found new ways to care for the well-being of our neighbor. During the pandemic, the Social Ministry Team partnered with the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano County to create a drive up foodbank in our parking lot two Fridays of each month. Over a year ago, a family in our congregation purchased a house specifically to be used by the Chico Housing Action Team to house four women who would otherwise be on the streets. A team from Faith Lutheran visits the house weekly to provide support and encouragement to those women. And we have begun partnering the Hunger Trolley to seek out hungry people in our community and feed them good food and warm love. These ministries were developed to find ways to care for our neighbor that could be done without congregating in crowds, but even now that we can be together in large groups, these life sustaining and changing ministries continue.

But there is one transformation resulting from this pandemic that I am most excited about: the return to small group ministry. If the past two years have taught us anything, it is how precious relationships are. The ability to gather with a group of friends in person is a blessing beyond measure. Already, several small groups are meeting, to connect with God through sharing life together. And in the coming months, more groups will be starting. You can find a full list of the small groups available in this newsletter. Our time apart was temporary, but I pray the enthusiasm to live life together never ends.

All this is not to say that the suffering caused by Covid has come to an end. Hundreds of people across our country are still suffering and dying of this disease. As a parent of a young child, I am mindful that no vaccine is available for children under the age of 5. So many of us have spent the past two years hyper-vigilant to protect ourselves and our loved ones; it is hard to begin to let down our guard. Like Doubting Thomas, we will need to touch and feel this transformed life in order to trust that it is real.

Jesus' resurrection did not end suffering and death for his disciples, but it transformed how they viewed their suffering and death. There may be more Covid variants and waves, but these two years have given us the tools –medical, technological, social, and spiritual– to face those challenges with confidence. God has done great things while we have been in the tomb, and God will continue to do great things as we step once more into the world.

Though hospitality itself is a language she is fluent in, she is also fluent in the language of coffee! "While [the welcoming tradition of coffee hour] was practiced briefly

last summer, it was halted when the Delta variant began its relentless march across country, with Omicron following directly on its heels, albeit with far fewer ramifications.

"Thankfully, fellowship after worship has re-emerged, much to the pleasure of many Faith Lutheran worshipers, as well as those who are making Coffee Hour happen. In Romans 16, Paul writes to the Gentiles and references numerous individuals and entities whose work reflects the love of Christ for all people. In particular, in verse 23, Paul brings greetings from Gaius who has provided hospitality not only to the entire church, but also to Paul, personally. Are we then not carrying on that same tradition established long ago? I dare say, Gaius would be quite proud of Faith Lutheran!

"While hospitality is experienced from the moment members and visitors alike set foot on the campus, it culminates in the sharing of God's love during time shared in conversation with one another after worship. One of the many perks (no pun intended!) of Coffee Hour is the opportunity of greeting those who are visiting Faith for the first time or those who have visited in the past and are considering making Faith Lutheran their new home. Greeting that individual or couple personally and possibly sharing coffee with them may be just enough to help them make that final decision. Faith has always been known for its friendliness, and our genuine hospitality cements that reputation."

Mary Schweder of the Equipping Ministry and intrepid Hospitality Table facilitator brings up a related piece of information: "Did you know that first time guests make up their minds about whether or not they will come back is within the first ten minutes of arriving on our church campus? There have been many articles and studies about what influences peoples' decision


to attend a particular church. High on that list of criteria is the "welcoming nature" of the members of the church. Knowing that, we can make a difference to first timers as well as seasoned members.

Then as a student nurse, I was told to treat every patient that I cared for as if they were Jesus. These two statements became like a mantra to me. When we came to Chico in the 70's, my 4 children were young, I thought it would be fun to help as a Sunday School Teacher, and when we started going to an Orphanage in Baja, the personal connection that I made with those children, that seed that



got planted made my heart grow and want to do even more. Since that time so many years ago, I have discovered what it means when thy say volunteers are a church's greatest asset; what it means to be alive in the church is to share your joys, your gifts with the world around you. God has given me so many gifts that I don't have time to do everything. # Earth Day: Invest in our Planet

While we need to take from the land for food and sustainability, we also need to be careful that we maintain good stewardship and do not exploit the wonderful things the earth provides." The Social Ministry Team invites members of Faith Lutheran Church to research and learn about ELCA-related social teachings, resources for study and education, and ways to get involved in actions that sustain and protect our environment; the resources God has entrusted to our care. Remember our future depends on us.

### Earth Day events in Chico:

- This year the Butte Environmental Committee (BEC) is hosting the Endangered Earth Event, an event that brings the state of our planet's current environmental crisis to the forefront. BEC is bringing the event to the heart of Chico with a "Walk for Earth" through downtown to the City Plaza. 
