# PASTOR'S ARTICLE: VOCATION

"God's Work, Our Hands." It's the name of a Sunday in September when each year our morning worship takes the form of direct service to our surrounding community. "God's Work, Our Hands" is also the tagline of our denomination, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. But more importantly, those words sum up the Lutheran understanding of vocation.

Today, most people think of the word vocation as referring to your job or your career. In the early 16th Century, when Martin Luther was growing up, vocation referred to having a calling to be a priest, a monk, or a nun. Indeed, the word "vocation" come from the Latin root *vocare* meaning "to call." But Martin Luther realized that Jesus didn't just call the priests in the temple to follow him, Jesus called fishermen, tax collectors, and women collecting water. Martin Luther realized the Jesus calls everyone to follow him.

Our vocation is the way in which we live out God's love between our baptism and our burial. Each of us is a minister, because a minister is someone who serves God. And while we can serve God in our jobs, we are called to live out God's love in every aspect of our lives, in every role and every relationship. If we are a parent, we have a vocation to raise and care for our children in a way that shows them God's loving care. If we are a friend, we have a vocation to be the loving arms of Jesus that hold our friend close in times of sadness and which give hugs of joy in times of celebration. If we are walking down the street, in that moment we have a vocation to be the face of Christ, bringing joy and peace to those we pass.

Our vocation goes beyond our direct interaction with individuals. When we knit a sweater, we have a vocation in that moment to be the cloak of God, keeping someone warm. When we grow fruit and vegetables in our garden, we have a vocation in that moment to be the way that God feeds our neighbors. When we repair a roof, we have in that moment a vocation to be the means by which God provides shelter. In Luther's "Exposition of Psalm 147," the reformer writes,

"God could easily give you grain and fruit without your plowing and planting. But He does not want to do so. . . . What else is all our work to God whether in the fields, in the garden, in the city, in the house, in war, or in government—but just such a child's performance, by which He wants to give His gifts in the fields, at home, and everywhere else? These are the masks of God, behind which He wants to remain concealed and do all things...We have the saying: 'God gives every good thing, but not just by waving a hand.' God gives all good gifts; but you must lend a hand and take the bull by the horns."



Luther is saying that your face is the mask which God wears when God is taking care of the world. Or as our denomination phrases it today, "God's work, our hands."

During our council retreat this past month, our main focus was pondering how we as a congregation might better support each other in living out our vocation in its various forms. One of the main ways we will be striving to do so in the coming year is by helping each person realize that God has given them unique spiritual gifts. These unique spiritual gifts allow each of us to be a different mask for God, a different set of hands to do the variety of work that God accomplishes. Some hands are better suited for planting a garden, some hands are best at making music, some hands can balance a checkbook like a breeze, and other hands hold people close in prayer. With whatever gifts God has blessed your hands, they can do God's work to bring forth the Kingdom of God here on earth.

Faith Lutheran wants to be a part of helping you realize how uniquely and wonderfully God has made you to transform the world through Christ's love. And so you'll hear me on Sunday mornings inviting you to consider whether you might have a specific spiritual gift. Further in this newsletter you'll find an article inviting you to learn about a spiritual gift and how you might put it to use. Our congregation already has so many people in it using their gifts to God's glory. I want to thank you for all you already do in Christ's name. And for those of you who feel like your days aren't filled with bringing forth God's love, don't worry, Jesus has something wonderful in store for you. I look forward to discovering it together.

# SPIRITUAL GIFTS PART XIII: MUSIC

"The gift that inspires a believer to express personal faith and provide inspiration and comfort through the playing of a musical instrument." -ELCA on Instrumental Music

"The gift that gives a believer the capability and opportunity to present personal witness and inspiration to others through singing." - ELCA on Vocal gifts

There are many spiritual gifts that folks identify with. Some might identify with the gifts of leadership, some might gravitate toward gifts of mercy, and some might hover closer to music which can go in two directions, including instrumental or vocal. If you've ever wondered about your gifts, please take a look at these questions and give yourself a rating (4 being always true, 0 being not true at all):

1-I love to sing and enjoy inspiring others through song. (Rating: 4 3 2 1 0)

2-I have sung before groups and felt a real sense of God's presence. (Rating: 4 3 2 1 0)

3-I am grateful and humbled that my singing has provided inspiration and hope for others on their faith journey. (4 3 2 1 0)

#1-3 TOTAL SCORE: \_\_\_\_\_

4-I find joy and express myself by playing a musical instrument. (4 3 2 1 0)

5-By my playing a musical instrument, inspiration has been provided for both myself and believers. (4 3 2 1 0)

6-Others have told me they were moved by my playing a musical instrument. (4 3 2 1 0)

#### # 4-6 TOTAL SCORE: \_\_\_\_\_

Now add the total of numbers 1-3, and then add the totals of 4-6 separately. What were your scores? The higher the score (typically 6-7 or higher), the higher the chance might be that you've got a gift for music, whether it be vocal or instrumental. Were you surprised at your results? Why or why not? You may score yourselves really high and it might come as a total surprise to you! What a delightful surprise as there are so many different abilities that one may possess between vocal and instrumental music. If you find yourself with a high score in either, you may be worried! We can help you plug into a group at Faith! There are so many opportunities to serve musically in and out of worship at Faith. Go ahead and flip the page!

# Sing at Faith

Cantor: leading worship through the singing of psalms and liturgy.

**Choir:** group song and hymn singing. The choir also sings outside of worship at some public events. Choir is an excellent way to build community as we regularly gather for rehearsals and for times of fellowship in and out of sacred contexts.

**Vocal Soloist:** often times we invite folks to sing in and out of worship from numerous genres including Renaissance music up to contemporary sacred and secular music. Many soloists have sung for gay pride services, regular Sunday services, and more.

Small Groups (duets, trios, etc.): during numerous times of the year we delight in have duets, trios, quartets and other small groups singing. This is a great way to get to know others in a smaller group setting and also to get to know the ins-and-outs of your voice.

# Play at Faith

**Contemporary Instrumentalist (guitars, drums, and keyboards.)** This group usually meets for Sunday worship, but occasionally meets for special occasions like Safe Space Winter Shelter or the Advent Workshop.

**Organist:** Folks are welcome to play our Stephen Russel & Sons organ, and we are always looking for substitute organists for worship. We also look for those who can assist with hymn playing, accompanying, and leading of the church's song as an instrument of our heritage.

**Pianist:** Pianists play an integral role in a number of musical spaces from rehearsals to contemporary music-making, to solo performance opportunities. There is always an open invitation to share your gift throughout each and every season at Faith.

**Brass:** At Faith Lutheran we also have a group of folks who accompany service on brass instruments including the trumpet, trombone, and tuba. The brass group typically meets for celebration days such as Reformation Sunday, Easter Sunday, and others as able.

**Bells:** Our handbell choir is an integral part of winter worship and Advent services. We are currently meeting for fall rehearsals, and whether you have never picked up a bell in your life or you're a long-time ringer, you are welcome to practice with us.

There are so many different ways to use your God-given gifts to lift up the congregation and community in song. What a joy it is to be able to serve a God who delights on our praise. # MERCY HOUSE MINISTRY, YEAR 2

In early 2021 Faith Lutheran Church teamed up with Chico Housing Action Team (CHAT) to establish the Mercy House – a home for medically fragile, homeless women – in a house purchased by Pastor Ben's mother, Patricia. Over the past year, the volunteer housing support team from Faith Lutheran Church, myself and Bonnie Pulliam, have met weekly with the residents of the home and offered support and friendship. Bonnie and I, together with the residents have celebrated holidays, birthdays, and the arrival of new grandchildren. We also mourned the loss of



a beloved Mercy House resident, Susie, in February. Faith Lutheran Church sponsored the installment of a Lending Library in Spring 2021 in the front yard of the Mercy House and our Spring project this year was the construction and installment of a raised vegetable garden bed which was dedicated to the memory of Susie.

We've had some turnover in residents over the past year. Sarah, who had lost her home to the Camp Fire and was facing homelessness after a long-term stay in hospital, was able to obtain a Section 8 housing voucher and moved into an apartment on her own. Contacted for this article, Sarah told me, "The Mercy House was the landing spot I needed to get back on my feet." Sarah added, "I truly appreciated that an entire congregation was supporting me and praying for me." Susie, who was on the verge of having to sleep on the streets when she was offered a room at the Mercy House, passed away on February 6, 2022. When I interviewed Susie for an article published in the September 2021 issue of Faith Talks, she told me, "Coming to the Mercy House was truly a miracle! I am so thankful for the friendship and support I have received from my roommates and from you and Bonnie."

Myrna and Terri, the original Mercy House residents, remain in the home and continue to be grateful that they have a roof over their heads. Both women had been living in their cars before residing in the Mercy House. Myrna recalls what she felt when she first moved in back in early 2021. "My first night here was the first night in a long time that I wasn't scared." Terri declared, "I remain profoundly grateful. When you are homeless, your self-esteem goes right in the gutter. My life today is so much better than it was. I am truly blessed."

Tona and Christine are the two newest residents of the Mercy House, once again bringing the residence to full capacity. Tona moved into the Mercy House in February 2022 after residing at Comanche Creek for the last two-years (See Tona's story in the December 2021 issue of Faith

Talks). In June, Tona underwent open heart surgery and is "extremely grateful for the assistance of her Mercy House roommates." Christine has been residing at the Mercy House since April 2022. Six months after her husband passed away, she lost her home in the Berry Creek fire and ended up living in the Torres Shelter prior to being offered a room at the Mercy House. Christine said, "What I value most about living here is the love and support I get from my roommates. The weekly meetings with you and Bonnie gives me the structure I need to get through each day."

A year ago, the sentiment most expressed by the residents of the Mercy House was gratitude – gratitude for things housed people tend to take for granted – sitting in the sunshine in the backyard, doing laundry at home, cooking together, access to a bathroom and most importantly, having a place to go home to. This year that sentiment remains as strong as ever and is best summed up by what Myrna told me. "I feel gratitude in my heart each time I walk through the front door and know that I am home."

# GOD'S WORK OUR HANDS ACTIVITY + ADVOCACY

On Sept. 11th, Faith Lutheran will observe the ELCA's annual "God's Work, Our Hands" Sunday. We will mark the annual day of service by removing trash and recyclables from Teichert Ponds and assisting with the clearing of the area's east side hiking trail. Everyone -not just participants- are welcome to come to church at 8:30 am for a blessing and communion. <u>There will be no 9:30 am service</u>. Afterwards, participants will head to the pond. Kid's Camp for elementary kids and youngers will be provided at the church for participating parents.

Cleanup is expected to take approximately 2 hours. Lunch will be provided at the church at about 11AM following the cleanup. Participants are reminded to wear a pair of sturdy shoes and work gloves. Our hands Sunday. For more information contact the office or call Doug De Soto at 530-354-1453.

For those unable to participate in the cleanup, Social Ministry Team invites you to be a part of God's Work, Our Hands in two different ways:

#1. Provide "one handed desserts" that folks can enjoy with one hand, to feed the volunteers. Desserts can be dropped off at the church the day-of, any time before 10:30 AM.

#2. As a Lutheran and a constituent, contact your federal legislators to encourage them to support policies to strengthen our country's disaster recovery efforts from weather events related to climate change. Two such policies are the Reforming Disaster Recovery Act (S.2471/H.R. 4707): A bipartisan bill that would, among many changes, increase federal response transparency with community partners, raise commitments to long-term resiliency after reconstruction, and authorize the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Disaster relief program into formal law and the Housing Survivors of Major Disasters Act (s.1605/H.R.3037): A bipartisan bill offering proposals to reduce documentation barriers and bureaucracy for families trying to access FEMA benefits after a disaster. Our Congressional representatives can be reached at: Congressman Doug LaMalfa, 408 Cannon House Office Building Washington, DC 20515 and Senator Dianne Feinstein, United States Senate, 331 Hart Senate Office Building, Washington, D.C. 20510. # **OUR SISTER PARISH'S NEW PASTOR**

#### Faith Lutheran Church is a financial and spiritual supporter of our sister parish in Rwanda. Here is a letter from their pastor, addressed to Marge Troester, who heads our Kagitumba, Rwanda communications as a part of Faith's Social (outreach) Ministry.

Dear Marge, Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Strongly I thank you for your kindness and hospitality of welcoming me to the companionship between Kagitumba parish, Faith Lutheran Church in Chico California and Trinity Lutheran in Alameda, California.

Before I become pastor of the Kagitumba parish, I served in different positions in the Lutheran Church of Rwanda, such as a parish pastor of Kigali, a parish pastor of Nyagatare; twice I was a district pastor of Umutara, twice I was a Principal of LCR-Bible School, and for four years I was Secretary General of Lutheran Church of Rwanda. I served Kagitumba in an indirect way especially when I was a district pastor of Umutara, where Kagitumba is one of 11 parishes which are under Umutara District. I served Kagitumba when I was a Secretary General of LCR. Currently I am a Principal of LCR-Bible School (Theological Education and Leadership Development – TELD).

I am married. My beloved wife is Mukundwa Rose. God has blessed us with four children, (Saveline, Rebecca, Eric, and Anitha) three girls and one boy. I and my family stay at a town called "Matimba." From Matimba to Kagitumba is 11 Kilometres, and so it is not far.

Thank you for sharing to me about Social Ministry Team at Faith-Chico. I appreciate the good job you are doing to serve God in your congregation, Synod, LCR- particularly Kagitumba parish. I am very excited for your progress and growth. It is good that youth are participating in Church.

There are some key issues in the parish that you may pray for, such as the finishing of our church building. I appreciate the good steps that have been taken, because there is some progress on the building, but we need iron sheets for roofing and finishing. This will help parish members to come together again in the church for Sunday service and other activities. Pray for our members and my family so that God will strengthen us to accomplish what we are suppose to do.

I would like to learn more about Faith Lutheran Church in Chico and Trinity Lutheran Church in Alameda California. (I would like to learn about children, youth, women, men, congregation daily activities, challenges, obstacles, successes, opportunities, lifestyle, etc., and other things that you want to share with us). The figures shown above are the year end figures for fiscal year July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022. As shown, during that period of time, expenses in the General Fund exceeded income by \$42,543.39.

This would have left only \$16,594.48 in the General Fund to start the new Fiscal Year, which would not have been enough to cover the cash flow needs for the first few months of the new year. Fortunately, there were funds available as shown above that were transferred to the General Fund to accommodate these needs for the first part of the year.

The Church Council is working to identify areas in the budget where cuts can be made. However, looking forward, cuts alone will not be enough to support the current programs and staff. It is going to take increased giving to support Faith Lutheran's needs going forward.

(b) Zimbelman and Michael will work together on a curriculum for what to do in the event of an active shooter based on CPD's recommendations. 8. Council Retreat debrief and next steps: Pastor presented major takeaways from the retreat. In addition to items on the document, council members were encouraged to chat with congregants about the upcoming potluck. Equipping ministry team will present more info in Sep. regarding All Saints celebration on November 6th. On Sunday Ben will define for the congregation what the term "ministers" means. Zimbelman, Heinz, and Hall will comprise the Sabbatical team. 9.Staff requests to be considered for membership: Ben presented that some of our employees are interested in becoming members of the church. Our current policy is that church members cannot apply to be employed by the church. Following discussion, a motion made by Mark Kimmelshue was passed that church employees may become members following one year of employment. It still stands that current members cannot become employees.

10.Rental agreements: Home schoolers and MTAC are seeking contracts.

11.Coffee donations have resumed in order to have this ministry be self-sustaining.

12.October Church Council Meeting – move from October 18th to October 11th due to Pastor Ben's vacation request. Approved following a motion from Groh.

13.Welcome Home Celebration on August 28th. Please wear a Welcome Home button provided by Dani. Introduce yourself as you feel comfortable doing so.

14.Communications: Pastor Ben will mention the landscape planning and dying lawn to the congregation on Sunday.

15.Announcements and upcoming dates of note: Groh announced that he will be leaving the US in March for an unknown period of time. He will be resigning from the council at that time.
