"Next year in Jerusalem!" It's what Jewish people say each Passover and Yom Kippur. It's a phrase that embodies the desire of a people who have been exiles for centuries to return to a home. It's said sometimes joyously, sometimes wistfully, but rarely is it spoken literally. And so it is a strange sensation to find myself saying it, not as a slogan, but as a travel plan.

January 16 – 29th, nine other members of Faith Lutheran's community and I will be traveling with three other Lutheran congregations to the Holy Land. I am so excited to see the places I have spent so much time reading about in scripture. I can't wait to walk in the literal footsteps of Jesus. I imagine myself having a profound spiritual experience as I step into the Holy Sepulcher where Christ was buried or being brought to my knees by the Spirits in Bethlehem. I'd like to believe that my biblical insights and sermon illustrations will be forever enriched by riding down the road to Jericho. But the honest truth is that I have no idea how the trip will transform me.

That's the point of pilgrimage, we go to encounter the divine. And God has a curious habit of not taking our plans into consideration. Encountering God is encountering a mystery. And so ultimately, pilgrims set out on their journey not to see their destination, but to seek God's desire. And since God is everywhere. We don't have to go to a specific place to experience the Holy; we simply have to open our heart.



Pilgrimage is not going to a place, it's going through a process. It's a process of opening ourselves to the unexpected, of stepping out beyond our comfort, of setting our intention to search for the Spirit in every step of our journey. It is a process which we can do anywhere. And in many ways, it's a perfect way to think of starting the new year.

We all have goals and desires for the new year. I hope to see the Holy Land. I plan to teach a class to prepare people of Faith to preach. I desire to deepen our congregation's direct service to our community. You have your own list of dreams and resolutions for the year.

But ultimately, we don't know what this year will bring us. So may we make our journey through 2023 a pilgrimage, a process of opening ourselves to the unexpected, of stepping out beyond our comfort, of setting our intention to search for the Spirit in every step.

Who knows how the journey this year will change and transform you? That is the point of pilgrimage. That is the joy of the journey. May we savor every step. You may not be traveling to Jerusalem, but you are traveling toward your spiritual home: Christ. Next year in Jesus!

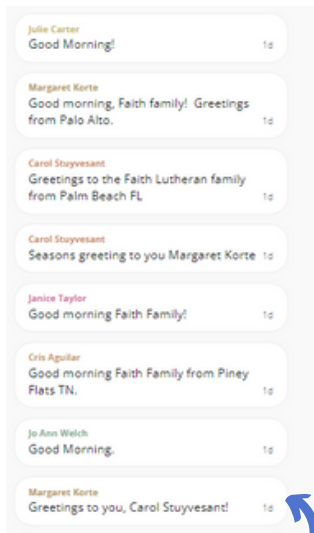

SOCIAL MINISTRY: A YEAR END REVIEW

As we turn the calendar to a new year, I will be completing my time as Chair of the Social Ministry Team. Over the next few months, the Social Ministry Team will be planning how to handle the leadership and administrative aspects of Social Ministry for the coming year. We encourage anyone interested in taking part in Social Ministry or one or more of the ministries supported by Faith Lutheran to contact any member of the Social Ministry Team or the office for more information. Here is a recap of some of the events we sponsored, supported, or advocated for in the 2022 calendar year.

January-June 2022

Faith Lutheran Church hosted the Safe Space Winter Shelter January 16th through January 30th. In true Christmas tradition, Faith provided room "in the inn" by housing 35 people in the Parish Hall. Faith members also provided dinners for shelter participants. The Social Ministry Team sponsored a Random Act of Kindness Day activity called the



"Clothes and More" donation drive in February for the North State Shelter Team's Mobile Shower Program. In addition to the towels, underwear, clothing, and hygiene products donated by FLC members, we collected \$1,000.00 in financial donations to support the on-going cost related to operating the shower trailer.

In March, Red Cross Month, the Social Ministry Team hosted a tabling event providing material and information on the American Red Cross. The Social Ministry Team invited FLC members to join the Red Cross mission by volunteering, giving blood, learning lifesaving skills, or making a financial donation. The Social Ministry Team, committed to raising awareness about health-related ministries in our local community, voted to formally support the work of the Shalom Free Clinic by allowing the group to use one of the church's classrooms for counseling purposes and through an ongoing financial commitment starting in July. In May we got on our state legislator's agenda to talk policy and justice for Lutheran Lobby Day! We virtually gathered with our neighbors from across the state for a day of advocacy, worship, and prayer. We met with different legislative offices, conducted 6 workshops with ELCA leaders, and supported bills for social, racial, and environmental justice in California.

Faith Lutheran participated in the Chico Pride 2022 event in June reaffirming our commitment to supporting the California North State LGBTQ+ community.



July-September 2022

Faith Lutheran Church and Safe Space teamed up to host a free, easy-to-access cooling center from our very own Parish Hall in August. We were blessed to be able to minister to those seeking relief and safety from the unusually extreme temperatures we experienced in 2022. The annual collection and distribution of backpacks and school supplies for students occurred in August. The 2022 drive benefited Fair View High School. 80 backpacks

filled with school supplies and \$600.00 donated for the establishment of a school library was distributed to Fair View High School.

Faith observed the ELCA's annual God's Work, Our Hands Sunday on September 11th this year. Members of Faith marked the annual day of service by teaming up with the City of Chico and the North State Shelter Team to restore hiking trails and remove trash from Teichert Ponds as well as getting to know our unhoused neighbors in the area. In September the Social Ministry Team and Church Council advocated for support of the North State Shelter Team's Managed Campground Proposal, a plan to provide additional shelter space to house the Chico areas homeless.

October-December 2022

The Annual Steve Troester Memorial Blood Drive took place in October. Members of Faith Lutheran signed up to give blood in the Parish Hall and over 25 units of life-saving blood were collected. Trans Day of Remembrance occurs annually in November. This year, in honor of the lives lost worldwide to acts of violence against Trans People, Stonewall Alliance teamed up with Faith Lutheran and planted flags in the church's front yard and hosted an outdoor candlelight vigil in the Faith Lutheran courtyard.

The Social Ministry Team hosted the second annual "Give the Gift of Pie" event during the month of November. This year's beneficiary was the Esplanade House. Thirty-five pies were collected and distributed to families living in the Esplanade House's transitional housing units.

In line with the Social Ministry Team's on-going goal of supporting efforts related to reducing homelessness and hunger, members of Faith continued to donate the food items needed to prepare one of the Hunger Trolley's Helper Group monthly dinners on a quarterly basis over the past year. The Social Ministry team hosted FLC's second annual holiday sock drive for our unhoused neighbors in December. Members of Faith donated socks that were gift wrapped and distributed on Christmas Eve to those living in homeless encampments in the Chico area.



In December, the Social Ministry Team sponsored Faith's Global Giving Tree that graced the entry way to the Sanctuary. The tree was adorned with ornaments, each a service opportunity in which members of Faith could support the ELCA on a global level. In addition to the events listed above, the Social Ministry Team remained active in the community through our on-going ministries involving the Mercy House, the Torres Shelter Dinner's, Blue Bags, the Hunger Trolley, the Parking Lot Food Bank, and the Shalom Clinic. The Social Ministry Team also provided support to other local service providers who work with those in need. During the first six-months of 2022, we offered financial support and other donations to Safe Space, the Jesus Center, the Torres Shelter, CHAT, and the Hunger Trolley.

The Social Ministry Team thanks the congregation for being a generous and caring body reflecting God's love to those we served over the past year! Happy New Year!

SAFE SPACE WINTER SHELTER

When we have recurring events like God's Work Our Hands or supply drives, I often hear our ministers ask, "What did we do well? What could we improve moving forward?" Cindy's article on page 10 is a great example of the introspective questioning I'm talking about. This kind of questioning equips us to improve with each event we host. One such event is Safe Space Winter Shelter, which we'll be hosting in the fellowship hall from Sunday, January 29th to Sunday, February 11th.

A lot goes into executing the winter shelter, and Faith and Safe Space are excellent collaborators, continuing to make improvements with each and every shelter we host. For example, Safe Space's staff and volunteers change often. This means that we get to make new, meaningful connections each year; this also means that we must make sure that all of Safe Space's new staff and volunteers are familiar with our facility, like how to take care of our kitchen or what to do in case of emergencies. Sometimes we rearrange things in the fellowship hall or sanctuary, and need to set new physical boundaries for them to work with. Sometimes the guest capacity or intake methods change. But at the end of the day it works, because we as a church are enthusiastic about goodness and mercy-inspired outreach.



As you know, Doug is stepping down as chair of social ministry (page 11). This doesn't mean Doug is leaving altogether - - what this means is that Faith Lutheran needs to work together to do God's work. Rather than have one person oversee the goings-on of Safe Space in its entirety, we seek 2 people to commit to communicating with Hilary, our fabulous contact with Safe Space. These 2 people and I will work together to make sure she and her staff have everything they need - - that they have spaces for cots and storage, that the facility use agreement and M.O.U. are drafted, etc. These 2 people ideally will be available as emergency contacts during the duration of the shelter, and would be willing to organize walkthroughs of the facility to make sure our campus is kept in good, usable condition. After the Winter Shelter is over, then these 2 people will have completed their point-people-ing! At our next Social Ministry meeting, we'll discuss the above: what went well, and what could we improve upon.



This model of sorts was created together by Social Ministry, the Equipping Team, and Dani Vogel who is our Small Group coordinator. The "model" consists of appointing roughly 2 point people on an event-by-event basis. In February, we plan find 2 different people willing to be point-people for February's National Acts of Kindness Day. Our goals here are to:

- ~ Promote collaboration.
- ~ Get people involved whose unique interests match the events taking place.
- ~ Prevent burnout by having one individual take on responsibility for all Social Ministry events.
- ~ Get diverse sets of hands involved in doing God's work!

Keep an eye out for the social ministry article in February's *Faith Talks*. We will be having an open discussion (and snack bar because snacks are life) next month. Everyone is welcome to come hang out at the snack circle as we talk about the ministry we'd like to see happen at Faith, in Chico, and globally.

SPIRITUAL GIFTS PART XVII: SKILLED CRAFT



Skilled crafting, a gift that each and every one of us possesses in a unique way! The ELCA describes skilled crafting as, "the gift that enables a believer to create, build, maintain or repair items used within the church."

So many crafters can be read about in the Bible, each skilled in their own way. Take Noah for example, who built an arc, or even Jesus who was a carpenter. Fortunately, we haven't needed an entire arc built at Faith Lutheran Church! But there is so much that we have needed, and somebody has always been there to graciously provide.

During the pandemic, our Quilters worked tirelessly to craft face masks not just for Faith, but for the entire Chico community. We're talking hundreds and hundreds of masks that were given away to anybody who needed them, including the fire department, police department, grocery stores, medical personnel, and the worshippers who returned to worship once we were out of quarantine. Each mask was unique. They all had different colors and patterns, and everybody found one that fit their style. Masking was (and still is) hard for everyone, but there is something special about wearing masks hand-made by the quilters.

Our youngest members of Faith use their skills each and every Sunday in the nursery, creating art for us to use during worship or to decorate the campus with. The mediums they use are wild and fun. Ask Dani Vogel, director of family life, to see what our little members create!

Linn Brownmiller and Glenn Pulliam stepped in recently to help us hang curtain rods and curtains in all of our classrooms. After a campus safety inspection, it was recommended we block the view from the Mangrove parking lot. Because Linn and Glenn helped out, the classrooms are less likely to be broken into. Without the curtains, anybody can see into the classrooms and it draws attention, so with blackout curtains in place, the rooms appear less interesting. There have been no break-ins since the curtains have been hung.



And what would Faith be without its handyman? Ralph Godwin is an insanely talented carpenter. His hands are the ones that built the nametag kiosk. He has a workshop at home, and has built some incredible things with it. Bob Bay is another name you should know. He recently came out to make repairs to the island in the kitchen which is both a cutting board and a storage space. The state of the island was a little dubious, so Bob stepped in to make sure it was in safe, usable condition for all those who use the



kitchen. But Bob's help goes way beyond that; he and his wife, Wei Wei, have been at Faith a long time, and Bob was one of the contractors for the building we all worship from today. And let's not forget Leo Weiss! When he isn't sailing, he's working on building projects in communities that need the help. He worked hands-on with C.H.A.T.'s pallet shelter, and has done plenty for Faith as well from carpentry to installing alarm systems to power-washing.

Have you met Jenny James yet? Jenny has been spreading joy throughout the congregation with her crafts and treats. A talented baker, she makes everything from brownies to peppermint bark to home made candy. Jenny also painted these rocks that show pictures like the cross, communion, and children praying. They're used by the Welcome Table when it's



windy outside to make sure that our brochures and sign up sheets don't fly away!

If you have a craft you'd like to share with us, let us know what your gift is! It is always helpful to be able to call on each other for help and share in ministry together.
