


Preschool Playgroup is BACK!

Pastor's Article

In May, we officially welcomed eight new members as part of Faith Lutheran Church. In the new members classes, I talked to these folks about what it means to be a member of Faith Lutheran. I realized, many of us may have been members for years and may have forgotten what it was that we committed ourselves to in membership.

Constitutionally, being a member has to requirements and two privileges. The requirements are: 1) Receive communion at least once a year, and 2) give a contribution of record once a year. The benefits are: 1) Ability to vote in congregational meetings, and 2) Ability to serve in governance roles.

But spiritually, being a member means so much more. When we welcome new members into our midst, we ask them if they intend to live out their baptismal covenant in this place. And then we explain living out our baptismal covenant means:

- We are called to live among God's faithful people: Being a member means you
 desire to share your life with us, to be the Body of Christ together, not just on
 Sunday morning, but through one-on-one relationships, small groups, and/or
 ministry teams.
- <u>To hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper:</u> Being a member means you desire to let your life be shaped by regularly participating in worship, hearing the Good News proclaimed in sermons and tasting the Good News revealed in communion.
- To proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed: Being a
 member means you desire to recognize that the Holy Spirit has given you unique
 gifts, talents, and passions, and that you want to learn how to use those God-given
 gifts so that through you, others might know God's loving presence in their lives.
- To serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth: Being a member means you desire to live your life not just for yourself, but for Jesus present in neighbors both near and far, and that you want to work together with our congregation to encourage yourself and others to carry out service to those neighbors.





Pride Month: A Letter from Michael

When I was 11, it started to sink in: I was queer. At the time, I was being raised by my fundamentalist aunt and uncle, and went to a large, large Baptist church in Sutter County. When my family found out, they said that if I were queer, I would have no place in their home. I imagined what I would lose: my church, my house, my family, everything. That's when I realized that Christ's love was conditional.

Christ's love was conditional until I was 28. My coworker, Rita Bova and her partner Linda Fischer, both long-time members of FLC, asked if I would volunteer at Chico Pride with the church. I was confused. So confused that I did it because I was darn sure it was going to be a...well, I can't use that term in Faith Talks, so I'll just call it a trainwreck. But it wasn't. I met Kathy and Grace Mahannah who were leading the booth, and they put me straight to work! A while later, Rita said that Faith Lutheran was hiring an office manager. I thought they would never hire a queer person, but au contraire! I was trained for my job by Susan Kimball, the wife of Shari Kimball.

Institutions of religion, often Christians, tell queer people we don't belong, but I have lived a pleasantly normal life since I've been here! I started taking transitional hormones a few years back, then had surgery. I was able to treat my surgery for what it was: a means to live the rest of my life in comfort and happiness, same as any other medical procedure. No one hounded me about it. What they did was provided a meal train which is actually how I met Faye and Carl Johnson, and Linda Rice. Aside from a 'hi nice to meet you,' their meals were our first interaction, and I have gotten to know Linda and the Johnsons more personally since. Then my husband had our wedding here, a normal, amazing wedding!

At Faith, I am able to worship, work, and have a family without condition. When a church banner or brochure includes a rainbow or an LGBTQ-positive sentiment, that church speaks to all the people who were taught that Christ's love is conditional, and says "it is not!" Then, those people are given the same opportunity I have been given: normalcy! Love! Church! Happiness! The occasional meal train! And all those things that make us whole. Thank you for loving me. 

Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference



\$727 was raised by our Lenten ecumenical soup suppers and gifted to the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference in Chicago. "The mission of the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference, Inc. (SDPC) is to nurture, sustain, and mobilize the African American faith community in collaboration with civic, corporate, and philanthropic leaders to address critical needs of human rights and social justice within local, national, and global communities. SDPC seeks to

strengthen the individual and collective capacity of thought leaders and activists in the church, academy, and community through education, advocacy, and activism."

"The Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference (SDPC) was incorporated in September 17, 2003 with the hope and faith that the organization would focus on what was proclaimed in the fourth chapter of Luke, to set captives free and to give liberty to those who are oppressed. It is what was envisioned by the three founders and theological giants, Dr. Iva E. Carruthers, Dr. Frederick D. Haynes III and Dr. Jeremiah A. Wright, Jr. who met, prayed and talked about giving birth to a particular "something" that could speak to the needs of those who were thirsty for sound biblical knowledge and committed social advocacy. Four of their colleagues then joined the discussion. And that conversation, the spark of an idea, became what is now the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference, a national network that serves thousands of pastors, lay leaders and the next generation of those working for social justice.

It is with this divine calling that the Samuel DeWitt Proctor entered the public square. And it is with prayerful dedication and purpose that we work to change the socio-political landscape for those in need as we continue our fervent quest and biblical directive to do justice. The Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference network, has been challenging communities and churches, hearts and minds of clergy and lay leaders, seminarians and thought leaders. From its inception, the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference adopted an organizational vision to affirm that there is no separation between the anointing of the Spirit of the Lord and the social justice aspects which that same spirit calls us to carry out day-by-day in the communities in which we live and serve.

Through the power of prophetic preaching, informed teaching and true social activism, clergy and lay work together, with, through and on behalf of those most vulnerable and marginalized in the world. We are making a difference!"
