# Pentecost: The Gift of Language Ever Changing

Verily, 'tis true that the generations agone bespoke a tongue noisome to the ears of modern men. Cool peeps nowadays DM in a whole new lit language to flex their rizz.\* Language changes.

Peeps: Short for "people." | DM: Direct Message, like a text. | Lit: Exciting, awesome. | Flex: to show off. | Rizz: short for "charisma." (Cool people nowadays speak in a whole new interesting language to show off their linguistic skills.)

In June, we celebrate Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit gave the disciples the ability to proclaim the gospel in various languages to people gathered from all over the world so that "each one heard them speaking in the native language of each" (Acts 2:6). Language may change, but the good news of Jesus Christ never does. Yet in every nation and every generation, the Holy Spirit gives us the ability to proclaim that good news in a way that people can understand.

In 1611, The King James Version (KJV) of the Bible gave the English language the scriptures in a language that the common person could understand. In 1952, the National Council of Churches, a council of 37 denominations in the United States, recognized that the English language had changed to such an extent that the KJV was no longer accessible to many English speakers. To that end, the National Council of Churches commissioned the Society of Biblical Literature, the oldest and largest learned society devoted to the critical investigation of the Bible, to develop a new translation for the English-speaking world. This new translation was called the Revised Standard Version (RSV). The RSV became the standard translation for the Bible used in academic settings as well as in most mainline denominations.

In 1989, this translation was further revised to form the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV), which we use in our worship today. In its explanation for the update in 1989, the preface to the NRSV states, "in the tradition of the King James Bible, [we are introducing] such changes as are warranted on the basis of accuracy, clarity, euphony, and current English usage, . . . as literal as possible, as free as necessary." It also stated the Bible's message "must not be disguised in phrases that are no longer clear or hidden under words that have changed or lost their meaning; it must be presented in language that is direct and plain and meaningful to people today."

At the end of June, we will be hearing in worship a new translation of scripture in the tradition of the RSV and the NRSV. This new translation is called the New Revised Standard

Version Updated Edition (NRSVue). It reflects both advances in Biblical scholarship and a recognition of changing language.

Between 1947 and 1956, hundreds of well-preserved Jewish religious texts from around the time of Jesus were found in caves near the Dead Sea. These are known as the Dead Sea scrolls. Over the last 75 years, scholars have slowly been translating these texts. As they do so, scholars gain a more precise understanding of what specific words meant during Jesus' lifetime. For instance, in the Christmas story according to Matthew, the NRSVue now uses the term "magi" instead of "wise men." This reflects that Greek actually uses the term magi, a category of person who studied the stars and searched for esoteric knowledge. It also reflects an understanding that ancient Greek, like modern Spanish, will describe an entire group of people as male if at least one person in the group is male. By using the word "magi," the NRSVue leaves open the possibility that some of the people who brought Jesus gold, frankincense, and myrrh were women.

In the last decades Scholars have also found more copies of ancient Biblical texts. This is important, because ancient books of the Bible were copied by hand. Occasionally, there are slight differences between copies. The more and older copies that scholars find, the more confident they can be in which differences were a result of scribes making mistakes or later additions. It is important to note that the vast majority of these differences make no difference to the message of Jesus or our theology. However, because every word of scripture is precious, the NRSV and the NRSVue both list major differences in ancient manuscriptures in their footnotes. One of the changes that you may run across in the NRSVue vs. the NRSV is what difference is included in the main translation versus the footnote. For instance, on May 18th, we read from the NRSV Rev. 21:3, which concludes "God himself will be with them." The NRSV contains a footnote stating that some ancient manuscriptures also add to the end of the verse, "and be their God." In the NRSVue the main translation concludes Rev. 21:3 by stating, "God himself will be with them and be their God." It then has a footnote that informs readers that some ancient manuscriptures lack "and be their God."

The NRSVue also reflects changes in how we speak of people. One of the main changes is in using people-first language. This means emphasizing that an individual is a person before whatever adjective is used to describe them. For instance, the NRSVue changes "slave woman" to "enslaved woman" (Galatians) and "demoniacs, epileptics and paralytics" to "people possessed by demons or having epilepsy or afflicted with paralysis" (Gospel of Matthew).

While these changes are helpful, I want to stress that there is nothing wrong with the NRSV. I do not plan to run out and replace all my bibles with the updated edition. However, if you use the Bible App, or read the bible online, you will forced to change to the NRSVue. This is because the National Council of Church is requiring all users of the digital copyright of the NRSV to change to the NRSVue. We will follow suit and, at the end of June, you will hear

the NRSVue on Sunday mornings. For your personal study, I encourage you to use a variety of translations. For your personal devotion, pick a translation that speaks to you. The Holy Spirit is present in every translation today, just as the Holy Spirit was present in every language on the day of Pentecost.

Speaking of language constantly changing and acronyms increasing, I encourage you to come to the workshop that will be held after worship on June 1st. It will be a presentation put on by the Stonewall Alliance in preparation for our annual outreach at Chico's Pride event. It is specifically designed to help give you language to better understand, welcome, and love the LGBTQIA2S+ community. The Holy Spirit will be there, too.


