For the month of May, the Special Olympics of Butte County will be our "The Greatest Gift Project".

Mission: Special Olympics Butte County, SOBC (parent company Special Olympics Northern California) is a volunteer organization providing year-round sports training and athletic competition in a variety of Olympic-type sports for children and adults with disabilities. This gives athletes opportunities to develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage, experience joy, and participate in sharing of skills and friendships. The vision is to provide sports training programs and athletic competition for all athletes within the county. Special Olympics athletes have a variety of sports they can choose from in Butte County such as basketball, swimming, bocce ball, track & field, softball, golf, and bowling.

Why it Matters: Most of the equipment and uniform needs are already met by SOBC. When the athletes compete in regional tournaments, volunteers purchase healthy snacks and drinks for day-long tournaments and weekend-long summer games. This is something we can help with. The competitions take place out of town, last all day and only lunch is provided. With physical activity and warm temperatures, the athletes need healthy snacks and drinks to get them through the day.

Pastor's Article

Throughout the season of Lent, we explored what it meant to be in search of a promised land. This Easter season, we'll consider what a promised land actually looks like for Christians. For followers of Jesus, the promised land is not a place in the middle east, but a shared reality lived in Jesus.

The most complete depiction of our final destination in Christ comes from the Book of Revelation. Revelation is a book that many people approach with trepidation. It is filled with images of destruction. But ultimately, Revelation is a book that promises the victory of love. Revelation was written as a letter of hope to early Christian congregations experiencing persecution under the Roman Empire. When the world order is aligned against you, the world falling apart sounds like good news. But Revelation isn't just about the end of the world as we know it; Revelation is the promise of the new world that the Holy Spirit will usher in: the City of God.

Each Sunday in Easter, we will read a portion from the Book of Revelation. Most of our readings will focus not on the old world ending, but on the City of God that Christ brings. It is a city full of people of every tribe and every tongue. It is a city with a wall, but whose gates are never closed. It is a city without a temple, for the Lamb of God is present for all to worship directly. It is a city with a river on whose banks the Tree of Life sprouts leaves for the healing of the nations. This is our promised land.

Throughout the season of Easter, we remember our unity with followers of Jesus in every nation by proclaiming the words of the Nicene Creed. When Roman Emperor Constantine became a Christian, we wanted the tenants of his new faith clarified. In the year 325, Constantine invited bishops from across the known world to gather in the city of Nicaea, in present-day Turkey. The bishops developed the Nicene Creed, a statement of faith to which nearly every major Christian tradition adheres. This year marks the 1,700-year anniversary of the Nicene Creed.



Yet sin is always present in the church. Christians have managed to turn this great unifying statement of faith into a source of division. In the year 1014, Latin speaking Christians in Rome added one Latin word to the Nicene Creed, filioque, which in English means "and the Son." This change can be seen in the italicized words of this sentence from the creed: "We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son."

This addition was done to emphasize that God the Father and God the Son share the same being through which the Holy Spirit flows. However, Greek speaking Orthodox Christians took this to mean that the Roman church believed God the Son caused the Holy Spirit. This disagreement was partly an issue of translation between Latin and Greek. However, this disagreement also became about who had the ability to determine the faith of all Christians: ecumenical councils in which all bishops from around the world gathered or the pope? On top of this, cultural and political differences between Latin speaking and Greek speaking Christians began to pile up, resulting in the Great Schism of 1054 in which Roman Catholicism and Eastern Orthodoxy formally denounced each other and split. This break in the church has still not been restored.

As a reforming movement that started within the Roman Catholic Church, Lutherans inherited the practice of including the filioque, the additional words "and the Son" in the Nicene Creed. However, this past summer, representatives of the Lutheran World Federation met with representatives of the Orthodox Church. The Lutheran World Federation acknowledged that the words, "and the Son" were a later addition to the Nicene Creed. Furthermore, the Lutheran World Federation has asked Lutheran congregations to cease including those words in the creed. Though ending the use of the filioque will not instantly result in unity with our Orthodox Christian siblings, it is an act of good faith to show that we as Lutherans yearn for Christian unity.

This Easter season, when we say the Nicene Creed, notice that we now say, "We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father." Though this may seem a small thing, it seeks to heal a great wound in the Body of Christ. May it be one of many steps we take to live into that promised land of the City of God where the multitudes of every nation worship together at the feet of the Lamb.

Congregational Annual Meeting



On May 18th, we will have our annual congregational meeting. This gathering of all the congregation members is the highest decision-making body within Faith Lutheran. It is a time to look back and celebrate all that we have accomplished in the past year. It is also a time to lay out our vision for the coming years and to vote on decisions that are necessary to accomplish that vision. Those decisions usually involve deciding on who will serve in the congregational council and determining the operating budget for the coming year. This year, we will have an additional decision to ask the congregation: whether to embark on a capital campaign.

Faith Lutheran had its first worship service in 1950 and finished building the first sanctuary in 1952. 35 years later, Faith began to plan a new sanctuary. The building we have now was finished in 1990. That was 35 years ago. Our building does incredible ministry. The sanctuary holds worship and public concerts. The fellowship hall provides space for community meals and shelter. The classrooms host Sunday school, support groups, and scouts. Even the parking lot is the site of a food bank.

After 35 years of serving others, our facilities need to be serviced. The roofs of all three buildings need to be replaced. Multiple HVAC units, also 35 years old, are on their last legs. The pillars that hold up the breezeway in front of the offices are crumbling. The fellowship carpet shows evidence of every event from the past 35 years and the appliances in the kitchen are making death rattles.

At the annual meeting we will talk about these and more needs and introduce a team who has agreed to organize the capital campaign. We are still getting bids on the various projects needed, so while we don't have an exact dollar amount yet, we expect the total cost will be several hundreds of thousands. The goal will be to raise that amount over a three year period. However, some needs, like the roof and the HVAC units, likely can't wait three more years.

To that end, the council will propose seeking a line of credit known as a construction loan. In a construction loan, while we would be approved for a large amount of money, we would only withdraw the amount we need for each specific construction project when we are ready for that project. This means that we would only pay interest on the specific amount that we withdraw for the specific project.

For instance, the council will ask the congregation to approve seeking a \$600,000 construction loan from the Mission Investment Fund, a ministry of our denomination that provides capital for exactly our situation. We would not pay interest on any of that until we use some to replace the roof, which will likely be around \$150,000. Once we use the \$150,000 to pay the roofing contractor, we pay interest only on that \$150,000. If the capital campaign raises the money quickly, we can pay back that amount to the Mission Investment Fund and no longer pay any interest.

We know you will have questions. We encourage you to come both to the Annual Meeting on May 18th after worship, but also to the budget conversations before worship on May 4th and May 11th at 8:30am.

We have received an incredible treasure of a church from the generations that preceded us. Now it's our turn to pass that treasure on to the generations yet to come.

COUNCIL MINUTES

Council Meeting Notes April 22, 2025, Faith Lutheran Conference Room

Members present: Pastor Ben Colahan, Jill Bentler, Steve Hall, Mark Kimmelshue, Alyssa Manes, Elaine Lund, Leanne Chrisman, Elise Gladu, Candy Munson, Dawn Stafford. **Guests present:** Bob Bay. **Members Absent:** Mary Schweder, Kathleen Pappani.

Call to order and reading of the covenant, and welcome

Devotions and prayer: led by Elaine Lund.

Approval of minutes from March: Motion made, seconded, and approved to accept the minutes.

Financial report: presented by Mark Kimmelshue. Discussed finances through the end of March.

Staff reports: emailed ahead of time

Facility rekey report/update: we will be getting the campus rekeyed in the next month or so.

Cal OES Grant Update: presented by Leanne Chrisman. Faith Lutheran received a decent score but did not receive a grant at this time.

Capital Campaign Updates: We want to make it a once-in-a-decade ask, and need council approval to expand the scope of the campaign. Motion made, seconded, and approved to expand the scope of the capital campaign project to include, but not be limited to, projects like new kitchen appliances, repairing the columns on the office building wing, upgrading safety features like security cameras and egresses, updating the fellowship hall with things like new flooring and sound dampening.

Discussion led by Mark Kimmelshue to talk about the funding part of the capital campaign. There is an ELCA-connected "Mission Investment Fund" that could give us a construction loan. We would only pay interest on the portion of the money that we're using. We can talk with people about the loan when we talk about the budget in the pre-annual meeting financial meetings that the congregation will be invited to attend. Motion made, seconded, and approved to ask the congregation to approve Faith Lutheran seeking a \$600,000 construction loan through the Mission Investment Fund.

Annual Meeting Planning: Annual meeting is May 18. Elaine helped organize and will recruit council members to help with setup/food prep/food serving/clean-up. We'll have door prizes again.

Proposed 2025-2026 budget: Reviewed and discussed budget draft. Several things will be fine-tuned, corrected or changed before the budget draft put before the congregation. Those changes include making sure current and projected salary for Family Life Director position is accurate, adjusting personnel benefits as needed to match salary, increase in benevolence fund for synod dean travel, increasing synod benevolence to support the synod and ELCA national church, moving the budget for proposed loan interest to a different part of the budget, increasing funding for the Torres shelter, increasing the budget for the equipping ministry. Motion made, seconded, and approved to approve the budget draft with the increases and adjustments as mentioned.

Council Updates: five new members will be joining council: Kate Ory, Faye Johnson, Cheri Sandberg, Karsen Bradley, and Chris Brown. New officers: Dawn Stafford will be president, Elise Gladu will be secretary, and Faye Johnson will be vice president.

Synod Assembly: Saturday, May 10th at Faith Lutheran. Synod voting will be happening June 14th and November 1st. Congregation will need to approve representatives; Dawn and John Stafford are interested.

Put it in the plate and Action items – no further discussion.


