Pastor's Article

But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare. – Jeremiah 29:7

We are citizens of God's kingdom first, and citizens of earthly nations second. But God tells the Jewish exiles in Babylon that even as they desire to return to their true home, they are to seek the welfare of the place in which they find themself and to pray for it. Their well-being is intertwined with the well-being of the place in which they live, even if it is temporary.

July is a month to reflect on what it means to be an American. I love this country. As a child of an immigrant, I know first-hand what a privilege it is to live in the United States. What I love most about America is that we are a nation defined not by ethnicity or loyalty to a monarch, but commitment to a set of values: that all are created equal and endowed with the inalienable rights of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

As a nation, we continually fall short of these American values, but they are the goal towards which we strive and the measure by which we judge ourselves. And as a nation, we have committed ourselves to a process of pursuing those values; this process is our constitution. Our constitutional democracy requires a commitment to valuing our neighbors as people and our democratic process for its own sake over and above the outcomes of the democratic process. This is where our faith is essential.


In Christ, we commit ourselves to the radical idea that each human being is a beloved child of God; that each person is loved and valued by God for no other reason than that God made them. In June, we heard the Apostle Paul write, "There is no longer Jew or Greek; there is no longer slave or free; there is no longer male and female, for all of you are one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28). This Christian commitment, that for all our worldly divisions we have a deeper unity in Christ, is what our nation desperately needs right now. We face great challenges as a country, but we cannot address them unless we can recognize each others' full humanity and engage in constructive conversation across differences.

During the month of July, I invite you to engage in patriotic improvement through Christian discipleship in five ways:

1) Each Sunday, we will include in our prayers of intercession our president, Donald, our governor, Gavin, and our bishops, Jeff and Elizabeth. Naming those in authority within congregational weekly prayers has been the practice of Christian churches for centuries. This practice goes back to 1 Tim. 2:1-2, which states, "First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for everyone, for kings and all who are in high positions, so that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity." Praying for those with power is not endorsing their actions, but asking God to guide their actions.

- 2) Join us for a potluck after worship on Sunday, July 6th. It's easy to demonize someone who is different from you when they are a faceless category or demographic. Breaking bread together reminds us that this country is actually composed of human beings with whom we share the vast majority of life in common. So bring a dish, sit with someone who you don't know well, and give thanks that America is composed of such good people.
- 3) Learn how to talk about divisive topics with grace. Our nation desperately needs to learn how to hold constructive conversations about complex issues with people of differing views. Leanne Chrisman participated in a Northern California Rotary Civil Discourse workshop, put on by the Berkeley Rotary Club, designed to help people do just this. Leanne will bring this practice of intentional listening to those with whom we disagree, reflecting back what we have heard, and articulating our own perspectives in our fellowship hall after worship on July 20th.
- 4) Remember that in our baptism we are one in Christ. After worship on July, 27th, head down to 5 Mile Park and remember your baptism! Bring a picnic lunch, water, sunscreen, and a swimsuit. We'll have time to socialize, but we'll also get in the water! 5 Mile is a perfect place to play in the creek if you have mobility challenges; it's wheelchair accessible. I'll lead a thanksgiving for baptism and through some serious splashing, we'll remind each other that in these waters we are one in Christ.
- 5) Care for the most vulnerable in our community. Starting July 28th, Faith Lutheran will host a cooling center in collaboration with Safe Space. Each day, from 2pm - 8pm, our fellowship hall will be open to anyone who needs to get out of the heat. In years past, I've been struck by the diversity of people who end up in our fellowship hall. Not only are there unhoused people who come in; senior citizens and young families who can't afford their PG&E bill find comfort and safety at Faith Lutheran during these weeks. Contact Safe Space or Faith's office to find out how you can support this ministry. We care for our country by caring for the people in it.

May we seek the welfare of our country and pray for it. May we be children of God first, and Americans second. May loving Jesus make us better at loving our nation.

By utilizing our existing network of community partners, we provide ice, water, and an airconditioned space for those in need. For the month of July, Faith Lutheran's Greatest Gift Project will support the <u>South Chico Community Assistance Center (SCCAC)</u>: a local, all-volunteer nonprofit providing essential food and supplies to neighbors in need.

SCCAC runs a full-choice food pantry on the 2nd and 4th Saturdays of every month, serving more than 7,000 people each year. More than just groceries, the pantry offers dignity, support, and stability during times of hardship.

One guest shared: "Right now, I don't have any income for food, so this is putting food on the table."

<u>What We're Collecting:</u> This month, SCCAC has a special need for baking supplies. Please consider donating:

- Small bags of flour and sugar
- Small bottles of cooking oil
- Other shelf-stable food (canned goods, rice, pasta, peanut butter)
- Toiletries (soap, shampoo, toothpaste, feminine hygiene)
- First aid items and paper goods
- Reusable grocery bags

Starting Sunday, July 7, bring donations to Faith and place them at the manger in front of the sanctuary. Your gift—whether one bottle of oil or a full bag of groceries—helps feed a neighbor, ease a burden, and offer hope.



FOOD BANK FRIDAYS, JULY 11 & 18 FROM 3:00-5:00 PM


