





# Greatest Gift Project



**Special Olympics**  
Northern California

**For the month of March, the Special Olympics of Butte County will be our “Greatest Gift Project”.**

**Mission:** Special Olympics Butte County, SOBC (parent company Special Olympics Northern California) is a volunteer organization providing year-round sports training and athletic competition in a variety of Olympic-type sports for children and adults with disabilities. This gives the athletes opportunities to develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage, experience joy, and participate in sharing of skills and friendships. The vision is to provide sports training programs and athletic competition for all athletes within the county. Special Olympics athletes have a variety of sports they can choose from in Butte County such as basketball, swimming, bocce ball, track & field, softball, golf, and bowling.

**Why it Matters:** Most of the equipment needs are already met by SOBC. When the athletes compete in regional tournaments the volunteers purchase healthy snacks and drinks for the day long tournaments and for the weekend long summer games. This is something we can help with. The competitions take place out of town, last all day and only lunch is provided. With physical activity and warm temperatures, the athletes need healthy snacks and drinks to get them through the day.

**How Can You make a Difference:** You can help by picking up a few items from the list below on your usual shopping trips. Bring them by our church on Sunday morning or during the week.

# Spring Cleaning

It's been over a year since our last spring cleaning! Time to freshen up the exterior, clean the rooms, and prep for painting and flooring installation. We could use about 50 folks for three hours on Saturday morning, March 7.

- Weed and add plantings to front and sides of church—replace lost tree on NE corner—experienced planter needed
- Plant several plants in south and west beds and hook up to irrigation system—experienced planter needed
- Hand re-grade (minor) the beds on the west and south, and cover with fabric (bark later)
- Clean leaves and branches off east alley tree beds and alley
- Clean up columbarium beds
- Re-lay irrigation on courtyard mound near basketball hoop
- Wash all windows inside and out of all buildings
- Clean all fans in rooms and fellowship hall
- Power wash concrete in courtyard and sidewalks—(if you have a machine we request that you operate your own machine for the morning or train people in its use)
- Construct new box over front irrigation valves—special assignment to someone who can do carpentry
- Dust and wipe all door frames and baseboards in all buildings
- Vacuum all rooms in all buildings
- Clean all sanctuary chairs and move from rooms as needed
- Weed and clean up areas on east behind sanctuary and on north behind front retaining wall
- Pull all tagged furniture and supplies from rooms for disposal
- Pull all tagged materials from rooms to be moved into other spaces
- Install shelves in room 5
- Strip baseboards and door trim from rooms to be painted and carpeted (to be determined)



If you have any of these items, we encourage you to bring them:

- Rubber mallets
- Razor blade cutters
- Shovels—small and large, flat faced spades and other
- Rakes
- Wheelbarrows—at least five or six
- Power washer, hoses, etc.- three needed
- Power tools and tools for irrigation box construction, shelf installation
- Everyone: Gloves for all hands, Hats, Sunscreen, long-sleeved shirt

# The Season of Transformation

Hello to all from the Equipping Team!

To engage with the transformative message of Lent, the Equipping Team invites children, families, and adult individuals of Faith to participate in the Transformation Chain project starting February 15. We are asking you to ponder how you've been transformed, and to write your messages and staple them to the chain. The paper chain will continue to grow and transform with us throughout the season of Lent. Paper is provided, and you can add to the chain on Sundays during service or during the workweek by coming to the office.



The question we all have is – What is an example of transformation?

Transformations happen every day. Some transformations are simple, others profound and deeply impactful. You can share any transformation you experience, no matter how big or small. Here are some examples:

*“A smile and pleasant greeting made my day and helped me.”*

*“Witnessing the Baptism on Sunday helped me again to believe God is alive and with me.”*

*“The music in church transforms and lifts me in spirit.”*

*“Seeing the beauty of nature reminds me what God can do.”*

When considering the experiences, ideas, actions, and music encountered daily, it is evident how these elements contribute to personal growth or transformation. We think this project will be a beautiful reminder of how God transforms us, and are excited to see the growth of our congregational chain and the spiritual growth of us all.

# Transformations

What causes transformation? The Bible is full of stories of transformation. Sometimes those transformations are sudden and dramatic, like St. Paul being blinded by Christ on the road to Damascus. Sometimes transformation is gradual, like the relationship between the brothers Jacob and Esau. While most transformations in the Bible are of individuals, scripture also speaks of the Holy Spirit transforming families, like that of Sarah and Abraham, cities, like Nineveh, and nations, like Israel.

Throughout March, we'll read stories of people who are transformed by their encounters with Jesus. Christ continues to encounter us and transform us today. Throughout Lent, we invite you to participate in ways that followers of Jesus have known Christ to transform them throughout history.

- **Hearing God's Word and receiving the sacraments:** When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him, and he vanished from their sight. They said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?" (Luke 24:30-32) Each Sunday, let Christ enter your life through the proclamation of scripture and communion.
- **Spiritual disciplines:** If you, then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him! (Luke 11:13) Each Wednesday at 5:15pm, join us for a class on the traditional spiritual practices of Lent, fasting, prayer, and almsgiving. Discover how incorporating these disciplines into your regular rhythm can help you encounter Christ in your daily life.
- **Fellowship with believers:** For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them. (Matthew 18:20). Join us Wednesdays at 6:15pm for a soup supper in which we break bread with people of faith from other congregations before those congregations lead us in worship at 7pm. Also, join us after worship on Sunday evenings as we share a meal at 6pm.
- **Public Witness:** [Jesus said] you will be dragged before governors and kings because of me, as a testimony to them and the gentiles. When they hand you over, do not worry about how you are to speak or what you are to say, for what you are to say will be given to you at that time, for it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of your Father speaking through you (Matthew 10:18-20). Each Sunday morning after worship, join us for a class on Christians and Authority. Learn how followers of Jesus throughout history have been public witnesses to Christ's kingdom in the midst of worldly empires. Discern how we can reveal Christ to transform our society today. This will be livestreamed.

- Caring for others: And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it to me' (Matthew 25:40). You are invited to share Christ with the homebound by bringing them communion, flowers, or song throughout the season of Lent. Look for these opportunities in March.

As you enter into these various practices, notice how Christ is transforming you through them. Perhaps you'll have a big "road to Damascus" moment where, like St. Paul, you radically change your life. Or perhaps you'll experience smaller transformations: feeling more peace in your heart, hope for the world, or grace in your relationships.

Whatever transformations you experience, the Equipping Ministry has prepared a way for you to share them. In the sanctuary, you will find slips of blue/purple/white slips of paper (representing the waters of baptism) on which to write down your transformations. You are then encouraged to fold the paper into a loop and attach it to a chain of other people's transformations. May this great chain of testimonies, like the chain of testimonies passed down through the generations, give witness to the power of the living Christ to transform our lives and our community.

# Kitchen Korner



*Our kitchen keeps evolving, and I hope you have taken a moment to stroll through and see the changes. Some are subtle, like the replacement of electrical fuses for a select number of outlets, and others are quite visible like the backsplashes and shelves attached to each new stove. One large, custom-made, seasoned griddle has been received and will be available when needed.*

*Some training on attaching and using the griddle without destroying the seasoning will be provided to those who are in charge of pancake breakfasts, etc.*

*The stoves already have gotten lots of use with many meals being prepared for Safe Space and more. While the stoves are available for everyone's use, we are asking that anyone baking in the ovens or cooking on the burners pay attention to spills and clean them up immediately. Please do not leave it for someone else to do!! Use only non-abrasive materials when wiping up spills in the oven or on the stove's surface.*

*You may have noticed that our supply of kitchen hand towels has dwindled to nearly nothing over the past month or two. If you take linens home for laundering, please return them to the kitchen within a few days. Many folks use the kitchen, and we need to ensure we have a good supply. Too, please avoid using kitchen towels to clean, dust off or wash various items throughout the church campus. You will find a large bin of "rags" in the janitor's closet to use for that purpose.*

*If, while doing your spring cleaning, an excess of gently used terry cloth kitchen hand towels are discovered (not bathroom hand towels), they would be welcomed in our kitchen! Feel free to leave them in the kitchen or drop them off at the church office.*

# Capital Campaign Update

As most of you have seen, the sanctuary roof is being completed. Next up are the offices and fellowship hall. The good news is that there is enough in the capital campaign checking account to cover the costs!

Once the roof is finished, we will begin work on the HVAC system. Currently it is estimated to run between \$80,000 to \$100,000 to complete this project. Currently we don't have enough to cover this next project, so we will, (for the first time), use the equity line of credit and pay it down as our pledges are received.

We would like to thank everyone once again for their amazing support. This isn't possible without all of us working together. For those that made pledges for the 2025/2026 fiscal year, (ending June 30, 2026), we would once again like to say thank you. The above figures represent the General Fund activity for the first 7 months of the current fiscal year. As shown Expenses have exceeded Income by \$23,668.43. In past years income in December has been very good and has brought in enough to make up for any Budget Shortfalls. Unfortunately this didn't happen this year. January saw a positive income of \$10,463.13 which helped to reduce the previous deficit. This performance needs to continue to insure that we don't have to make major cuts to programs and staff. Please prayerfully consider increasing your General Fund giving.
